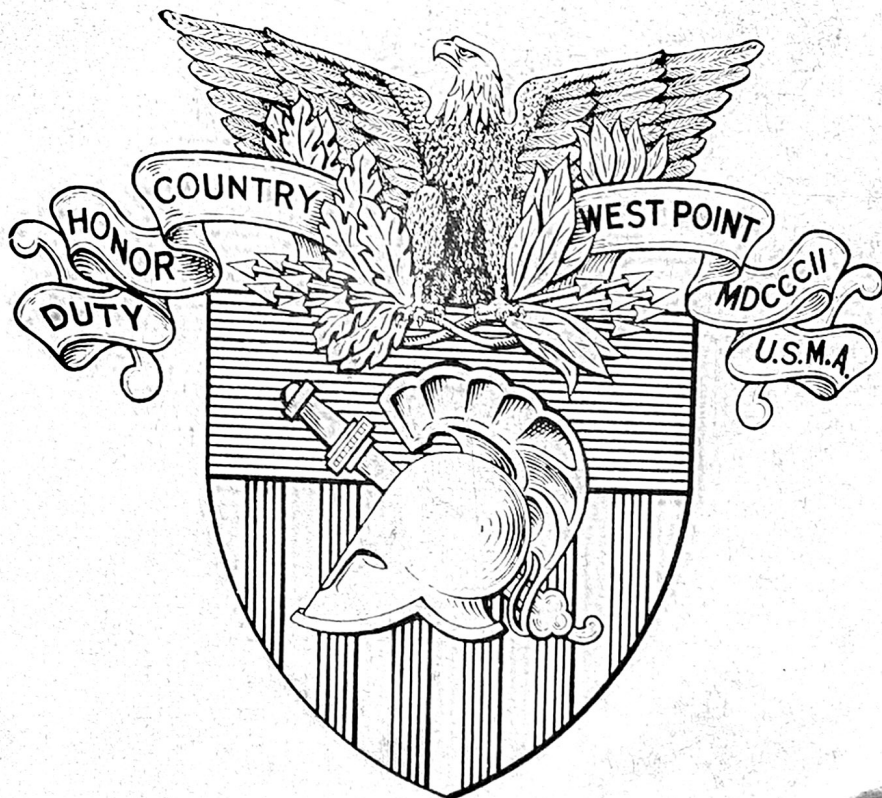

F O R E W O R D



THE FIRST DECADE

This Spring marks the 10th successive year that college representatives from throughout the nation have journeyed here to participate in the West Point National Invitational Debate Tournament. While this tournament is not the only national competition in debate in this country today, we feel that the winner in a tournament of district champions, such as this, represents the survivor in competition that is open to any undergraduate collegiate debate team in the nation.

The idea of the West Point Tournament seems to have evolved from two sources at about the same time and found its aegis in the renaissance of cadet extra-curricular activity which followed the war years of 1941 through 1945. During the Second World War the accelerated educational program left little time in the cadet's training for extra-curricular pursuits. But when the curriculum was again expanded to four years, Cadet Tom Schwinn took the reins of the recently re-established Debate Council and in the ensuing year arranged a small regional debate tournament. With the success of this intercollegiate meeting, the cadets were encouraged to think in terms of a larger, more comprehensive tournament -- perhaps national in scope. Simultaneously there was much discussion in other debate circles. It was generally agreed among inter-collegiate debate coaches that there should be a national tournament. And West Point seemed to be a logical and generally acceptable place in which to convene these annual meetings.

But the ambition of the cadets and the interest of their collegiate associates probably would have never found form as a national tournament had it not been for the aid and advice of such officers as General Maxwell D. Taylor, then Superintendent of the Military Academy, Colonel L. J. Legere, at that time a member of the Department of Social Sciences, and Colonel G. A. Lincoln, the present Professor and Head of the Department of Social Sciences at West Point. These men gave generously of their time in support of the project. They encouraged the few members of that early Debate Council and helped to pave the way for the first national invitational tournament.

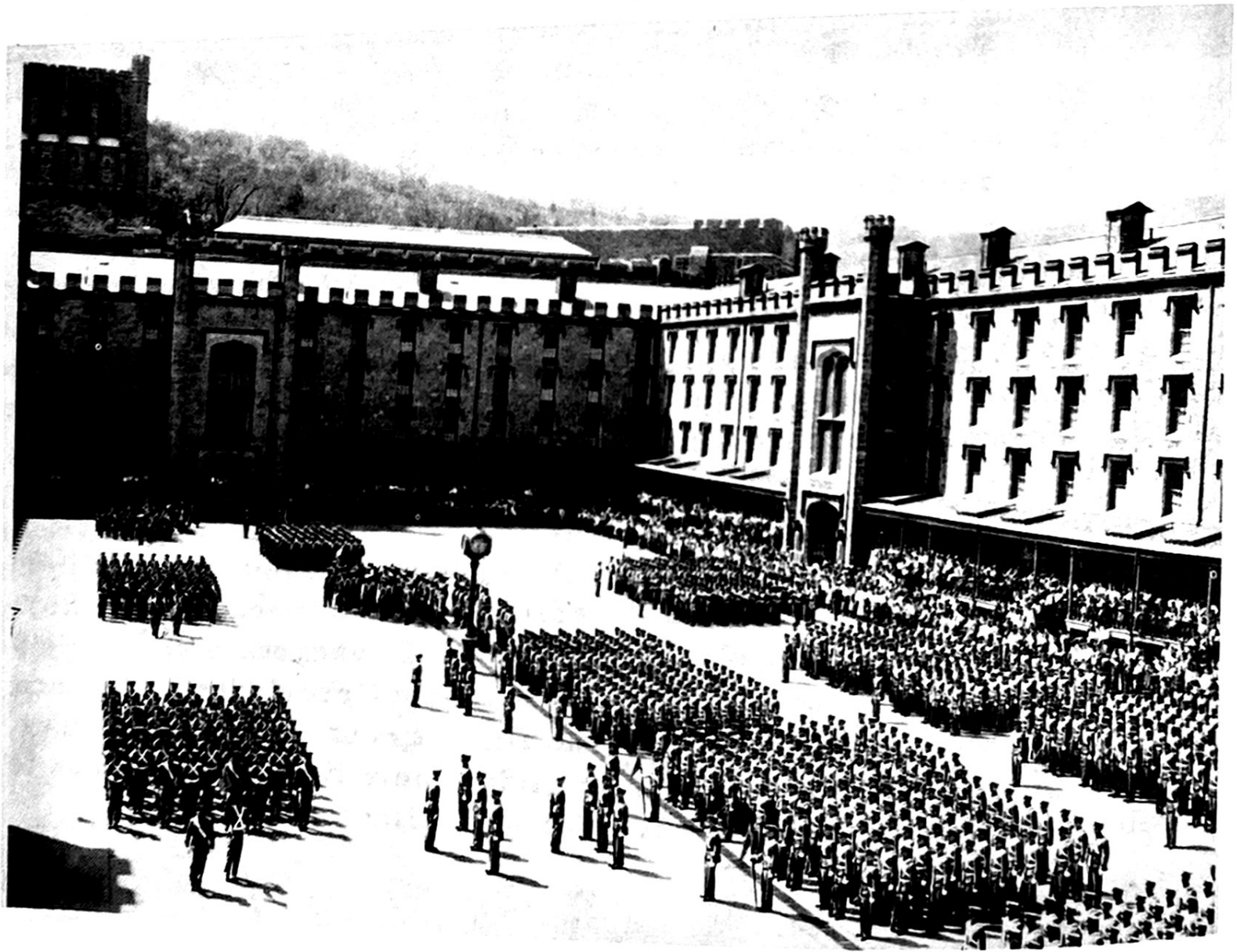
Administratively little has changed in the tournament's ten year evolution. The Academy does not propose to select the regional participants. The nation is divided into eight areas, by a more or less mathematical scheme, largely determined by debate population. And the selection of regional representatives becomes the responsibility of the member schools of each region.

But if the administration has remained static, the administrators have certainly changed with each successive year. In 1947 two cadets figured strongly in the developing of this embryonic tournament and its administrative machinery -- Sidney Berry, president of the Debate Council, and Abbott Greenleaf, secretary of the 1948 staff. Today, these two officers -- Major Berry and Captain Greenleaf -- are once again at West Point; this time as instructors in the Department of Social Sciences. And today, just as ten years ago, they are again giving their time and services to the West Point Debate Council -- now as advisors and officer sponsors.

In an effort to determine the participation that they might expect in a national tourney, the West Point Debate Council polled over one thousand colleges and universities in 1946. The response was very enthusiastic. With this encouragement the cadets began to lay the foundation and devise an organization which would be capable of handling the myriad tasks involved in such an undertaking. Concurrently in every part of the country, leaders in the forensic field gave generously of their valuable time to perform the necessary pre-tournament district tasks that enabled them to bring outstanding debate teams together for this event.

For those interested in the history of the tournament, we have attempted in this year's brochure, commemorating the tenth annual competition, to summarize the tournament's progress to date. We feel that not only are the results of the past nine years interesting in themselves, but they reflect the growing stability and scope of the tournament. Included, therefore, in this year's program are lists of the participants over the last nine years, indicating winners and runners-up and records of their performances. From these lists it can be seen that the tournament is truly national in scope, attracting teams representing a cross-section of the finest inter-collegiate debating in the country.

With the modest sixteen team tourney of 1946 as a background, the Debate Council launched the first national competition in April of 1947. This Spring, ten years after the first tournament, thirty-six teams representing the nation's colleges and universities are again gathered here to debate the national topic. During the tournament, team coaches and visiting speech professors will be carrying the responsible burden of judging the more than one hundred and fifty debates which will take place in a three-day period. To these individuals and especially to the student debaters we express our gratitude, for with them rests the greatest measure of the success of this first decade of the West Point National Invitational Debate Tournament.

TEAM MATCHING AND JUDGE SELECTION

Because of the close time schedule required to complete all debates, it is requested that all participants, judges, and faculty members refrain from visiting statistics and matching room. In the interest of expediency and fairness statistics will not be allowed to give information to anyone. Persons desiring to visit the statistics room are invited to do so after 10:30 a. m., 28 April.

In general, these rules will govern team matchings in the eight seeding room.

1. No team debates the same team twice.
2. No team debates a team from its own district.
3. Teams debate opposite sides of question an equal number of times.
4. Teams debate alternate sides from round to round.
5. Teams are matched according to win-loss record.

Criteria for assigning judges are as follows:

1. No judge will judge a team from his own district.
2. No judge will judge the same team twice, unless absolutely necessary and then on the opposite side.
3. When it is necessary to assign one judge instead of three:
 - a. Teams with the best records are given three judges.
 - b. A team may be required to have a single judge only twice.

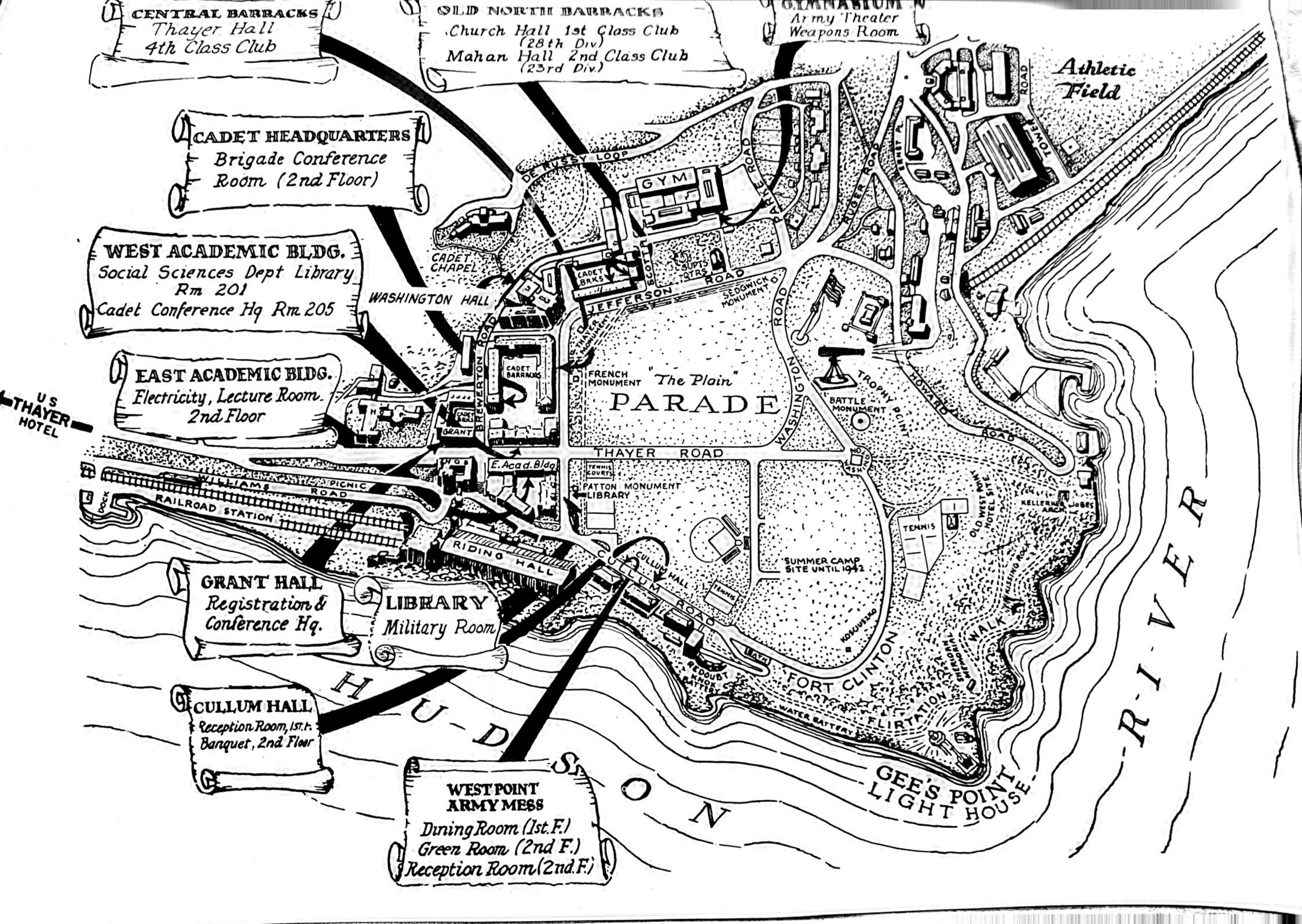
