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

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THE FIRST DECADE

This Spring marks the 10th successive year that college representatives from throughout the nation have journeyed here to participate in the West Point National Invitational Debate Tournament. While this tournament is not the only national competition in debate in this country today, we feel that the winner in a tournament of district champions, such as this, represents the survivor in competition that is open to any undergraduate collegiate debate team in the nation.

The idea of the West Point Tournament seems to have evolved from two sources at about the same time and found its aegis in the renascence of cadet extra-curricular activity which followed the war years of 1941 through 1945. During the Second World War the accelerated educational program left little time in the cadet's training for extra-curricular pursuits. But when the curriculum was again expanded to four years, Cadet Tom Schwinn took the reins of the recently re-established Debate Council and in the ensuing year arranged a small regional debate tournament. With the success of this intercollegiate meeting, the cadets were encouraged to think in terms of a larger, more comprehensive tournament -- perhaps national in scope. Simultaneously there was much discussion in other debate circles. It was generally agreed among intercollegiate debate coaches that there should be a national tournament. And West Point seemed to be a logical and generally acceptable place in which to convene these annual meetings.

But the ambition of the cadets and the interest of their collegiate associates probably would have never found form as a national tournament had it not been for the aid and advice of such officers as General Maxwell D. Taylor, then Superintendent of the Military Academy, Colonel L. J. Legere, at that time a member of the Department of Social Sciences, and Colonel G. A. Lincoln, the present Professor and Head of the Department of Social Sciences at West Point. These men gave generously of their time in support of the project. They encouraged the few members of that early Debate Council and helped to pave the way for the first national invitational tournament.


Administratively little has changed in the tournament's ten year evolution. The Academy does not propose to select the regional participants. The nation is divided into eight areas, by a more or less mathematical scheme, largely determined by debate population. And the selection of regional representatives becomes the responsibility of the member schools of each region.

But if the administration has remained static, the administrators have certainly changed with each successive year. In 1947 two cadets figured strongly in the developing of this embryonic tournament and its administrative machinery -- Sidney Berry, president of the Debate Council, and Abbott Greenleaf, secretary of the 1948 staff. Today, these two officers -- Major Berry and Captain Greenleaf -- are once again at West Point; this time as instructors in the Department of Social Sciences. And today, just as ten years ago, they are again giving their time and services to the West Point Debate Council -- now as advisors and officer sponsors.
