The Larmon Trophy has been awarded annually since 1947 to the winning team in the National Debate Tournament at West Point. This trophy is the gift of Mr. Sigurd S. Larmon of Young and Rubicam, Incorporated, New York City.

HISTORY

This Spring marks the fifteenth successive year that college representatives from throughout the nation have journeyed to West Point to participate in the National Debate Tournament. Through eight seeding rounds and four elimination rounds these teams will vie for possession of the coveted Sigurd S. Larmon Trophy, emblematic of the national collegiate debating championship.

The idea of the Tournament at West Point evolved from two sources at about the same time and found its aegis in the renascence of cadet extra-curricular activity which followed the war years of 1941 through 1945. During the Second World War the accelerated program left little time in the cadet's training for extra-curricular pursuits. But when the curriculum was again expanded to four years, Cadet Tom Schwinn took the reins of the recently re-established Debate Council and in the ensuing year arranged a small regional debate tournament. With the success of this intercollegiate meeting, the cadets were encouraged to think in terms of a larger, more comprehensive tournament -- perhaps national in scope. Simultaneously there was much discussion in other debate circles. It was generally agreed among interecollegiate debate coaches that there should be a national tournament. West Point seemed to be a logical and generally acceptable place at which to convene these annual meetings.

The ambition of the cadets and the interest of their collegiate associates probably would never have found form as a national tournament, however, had it not been for the aid and advice of such officers as General Maxwell D. Taylor, then Superintendent of the Military Academy; Colonel Chester L. Johnson, at that time a member of the Department of Social Sciences; and Colonel G. A. Lincoln, the present Professor and Head of the Department of Social Sciences at West Point. These men gave generously of their time in support of the project. They encouraged the few members of the early Debate Council and helped to pave the way for the first national tournament.

Administratively, little has changed in the Tournament's fourteen-year evolution. The Academy does not propose to select the regional participants. The nation is divided into eight areas by a more or less mathematical scheme determined by debate population. The selection of the regional representatives becomes the responsibility of the member schools of each region. In every part of the country leaders in the forensic field give generously of their valuable time to perform the necessary pre-Tournament district tasks that enable them to bring outstanding debate teams together for this event.

This Spring thirty-eight teams representing the nation's colleges and universities are again gathered at West Point to debate the national topic. Included in this year's program are lists which summarize the progress of the Tournament and reflect its growing stability and scope. From these lists it can be seen that this Tournament is truly national in scope, attracting teams representing a cross-section of the finest intercollegiate debating in the country.

FOURTEENTH NATIONAL DEBATE TOURNAMENT AT WEST POINT

20-23 April 1960

FINAL RESULTS

The Fourteenth National Debate Tournament was held at the United States Military Academy from 20-23 April inclusive. As in preceding years, thirty-six teams from all parts of the country debated eight seeding rounds of strength versus strength pairings the first two days, and the top sixteen teams participated in the elimination rounds on the final day.

Dartmouth College won the National Debate Tournament and became the possess sor for one year of the Sigurd S. Larmon Trophy. Debating the affirmative side of the national debate topic, Resolved, That Congress should be given the power to reverse decisions of the Supreme Court, Dartmouth defeated San Diego State College in the final round by a 5-2 vote.

On the evening of 22 April, following the completion of eight seeding rounds, a banquet was held in Cullum Hall. General C. V. R. Schuyler gave the principal address, and the top sixteen teams were announced as were the two speakers receiving the highest number of speakers' points. Donald Herrick of William Jewell College and George Schell of Baylor University, the two top speakers, were presented wrist watches. The watches presented to the two top speakers have been designated the Lt. George W. P. Walker Memorial Awards, in memory of the former West Point debater and Tournament winner. The members of the two finalist teams, Anthony Roisman and Saul Baernstein of Dartmouth and John Raser and Robert Arnhym of San Diego State College, each received prize watches, designated as the Hamilton Award, following the final debate. These watches were made possible through the courtesy of the Hamilton Watch Company, Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

The sixteen teams entering the elimination rounds were selected on the following basis:

First, on number of debates won during the seeding rounds. Second, in case of ties, on the number of judges! votes received. Third, if a tie still existed, on total team points.


