ENTERTAINMENT

ORIENTATION AND GET-TOGETHER

At 8:00 p. m., Wednesday, 24 April, the cadet staff will give an Orientation in the Tournament Headquarters, Lee Hall. Following this short presentation, all judges, coaches, and senior observers are invited to attend an informal reception in the Point Officer's Club. All other participants are invited to remain at Lee Hall for an informal get-together. Refreshments will be available.

DEBATERS' RECEPTION

At 7:30 p. m. on Thursday there will be a reception for debaters and their guests in the Weapon's Room of the Gymnasium.

ACADEMY TOURS

There will be guided bus tours of West Point at 2:30 p. m. on Thursday, 29 April. The tour will begin in front of Lee Hall, and will last approximately 45 minutes. Buses will be back at Lee Hall in time to attend Debate Round 4 at 3:45 p. m.

CLASSROOM TOURS

There will be guided tours of academic classrooms and laboratories. All duty-free judges and coaches may take advantage of these tours by contacting the Information Desk in Lee Hall during any of the eight seeding rounds. All free debaters may take advantage of these tours on Saturday morning, 27 April, by using the same procedure.

BANQUET

On Friday at 7:00 p. m., the Debate Tournament Banquet will be held at Cullum Hall. Awards to top individual speakers will be presented and the names of the 16 finalist teams will be announced. Entertainment will be provided by the Post Orchestra.

STATISTICS ROOM TOUR

A tour of the Statistics Room has been arranged for all participants, judges, and coaches anytime after 10:30 a. m., Saturday. The Statistics Room is located in Room 133, Thayer Hall. Guides will leave from the Information Desk in Lee Hall.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON ACTIVITIES

At noon, Saturday, there will be a parade by the U. S. Corps of Cadets. All interested may attend. The location will be announced in Lee Hall Saturday morning. Following the parade, there will be several athletic events which are open to all. A schedule of these events may be obtained at the Information Desk in Lee Hall.

HOUSING

1. All participants will reside at the U.S. Hotel Thayer, located on post at West Point, during the Tournament.

2. The Debate Council will pay housing expenses for all guest judges. Coaches, female and male debaters will be charged \$2.00 per night for their rooms. The Debate Council is not authorized to incur any expenses for the wives, families, or guests of participants.

3. Because of the limited space available, all participants must check out on Saturday, 27 April, before leaving the hotel to attend the debates for that day. Reservations for participants who desire to stay at the Hotel Thayer over the weekend must be made on an individual basis as early as possible after arriving at West Point. Everyone will check out on an individual basis, even though his bill is being paid entirely or in part by the Debate Council.

4. The Hotel will be happy to check all bags and belongings for participants who check out and attend the final debates on Saturday. It is urged that everyone concerned check their bags at the Hotel inasmuch as storage facilities are limited at the central part of the post.

5. The Hotel will be happy to call anyone at a certain hour if desired. Please notify the clerk at the main desk in the Hotel lobby upon arrival if you desire to rise at a specific time.

PARKING

During daylight hours facilities in the central part of the post, particularly near Tournament Headquarters, are extremely limited. Those participants staying at the Hotel Thayer are requested to park their cars at the hotel and utilize tournament transportation. Your cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

TRANSPORTATION

Shuttle transportation has been arranged for you during your stay at West Point. Bus transportation has been scheduled for those times when participants will be going to meals, debates, and other functions occurring during the course of the tournament. Sedan service will be provided at other times between 6:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight on call from Lee Hall. Commercial taxi service for both on and off-post use is available. Shuttle buses will operate continually between hours indicated.

DINING

1. All male debaters will eat in the Cadet Dining Hall at the times prescribed below. They will be seated in groups of eight with two Cadet Escorts at tables provided in a section of the Cadet Dining Hall reserved for Debate Tournament participants. Prior to the meals, debaters will assemble in Lee Hall where they will meet their escorts.

2. The hours for meals in the Cadet Dining Hall (Washington Hall) are as follows: Breakfast - 6:45 AM; Dinner - 12:10 PM; Supper - 6:15 PM.

3. Provisions have been made for the feeding of all senior advisers, judges, coaches, and women debaters at the West Point Army Mess (Officer's Club - Cullum Hall) for dinner and supper, and in the Main Dining Room of the Hotel Thayer for breakfast only. To facilitate the keeping of records by the Officer's Club, the Hotel Thayer, and the West Point Debate Council, diners will sign both their name and the name of their school to their checks at the beginning of each meal. Observers, guests, children, and all other non-participants in the Tournament are authorized to dine at the Officer's Club (Cullum Hall) and will pay in cash at each meal. Cadet escorts will accompany participants to the Officer's Club (Cullum Hall) daily for all meals excluding breakfast. Male debaters eat all meals in Washington Hall.

4. The hours for meals in the Officer's Club (Cullum Hall) and Hotel Thayer Dining Room are as follows:

Breakfast	6:45 AM to 7:30 AM (Hotel Thayer)
Dinner	11:30 AM to 1:00 PM
Supper	6:00 PM to 7:30 PM

5. Visitors are urged to arrange their schedules in order to meet their Tournament commitments.

6. All senior advisers, coaches and judges have been extended a temporary membership in the West Point Officer's Club. All expenses other than scheduled meals must be paid by the individual in cash at the Officer's Club (Cullum Hall). All senior members are invited to take advantage of the facilities provided by the Club.

7. All participants are asked to wear their identification cards at all times.

DEBATE PROCEDURES & JUDGING INSTRUCTIONS

1. At the start of each round, which will begin in Lee Hall with announcement over the public address system, please report to the indicated lettered station. These stations will be found placed on the walls of Lee Hall. The chairman-timekeeper of the debate will meet the teams and judges at the lettered station and will conduct them to the room where the debate will take place. He will also present the judges a judging form and an envelope. To facilitate the administration of this tournament, everyone should be present in Lee Hall a half hour before the time of the debate round, and should report promptly to his lettered station when instructed to do so by the public address system.

2. At the conclusion of the debate, judges will make their decision on the judging form, filling out all sections. Place the form in the envelope, and hand it to the cadet escort, who, after checking it for completeness, will seal it and take it immediately to the Statistics Room (133 of Thayer Hall).

3. Judges will not announce their decision to the contestants during the seeding rounds. The final team ratings will be announced at the banquet following the completion of the eighth round. We also ask that the judges do not give a critique during the seeding rounds.

4. The above procedure will apply for each round of the tournament. We ask your cooperation in being on time for the start of the rounds in Lee Hall.

5. On Saturday morning all Tournament personnel will report to Lee Hall prior to the time for the semi-final round. As soon as judges have been obtained, all eliminated teams may leave.

TEAM MATCHING AND JUDGE SELECTION

Because of the close time schedule required to complete all debates, it is requested that all participants, judges, and faculty members refrain from visiting the statistics and matching room. In the interest of expediency and fairness, statisticians will not be allowed to give information to anyone. Persons desiring to visit the statistics room are invited to do so after 10:30 AM on Saturday, 27 April.

In general, these rules will govern team matchings in the eight seeding rounds:

1. No team debates the same team twice.
2. No team debates a team from its own district.
3. Teams debate opposite sides of the question an equal number of times.
4. Teams debate alternate sides from round to round.
5. Teams are matched according to win-loss record.

Criteria for assigning judges are as follows:

1. No coach will judge a team from his own district.
2. No judge will judge the same team twice, unless absolutely necessary, and then on the opposite side.
3. When it is necessary to assign one judge instead of three:
 - a. Teams with the best record are given three judges.
 - b. A team may be required to have a single judge only twice.

1. Use the following point scale:
Superior 50-41
Excellent 40-31
Good 30-21

No rating should be given below 21, it being assumed that any debater who is representing a district is at least above the average.

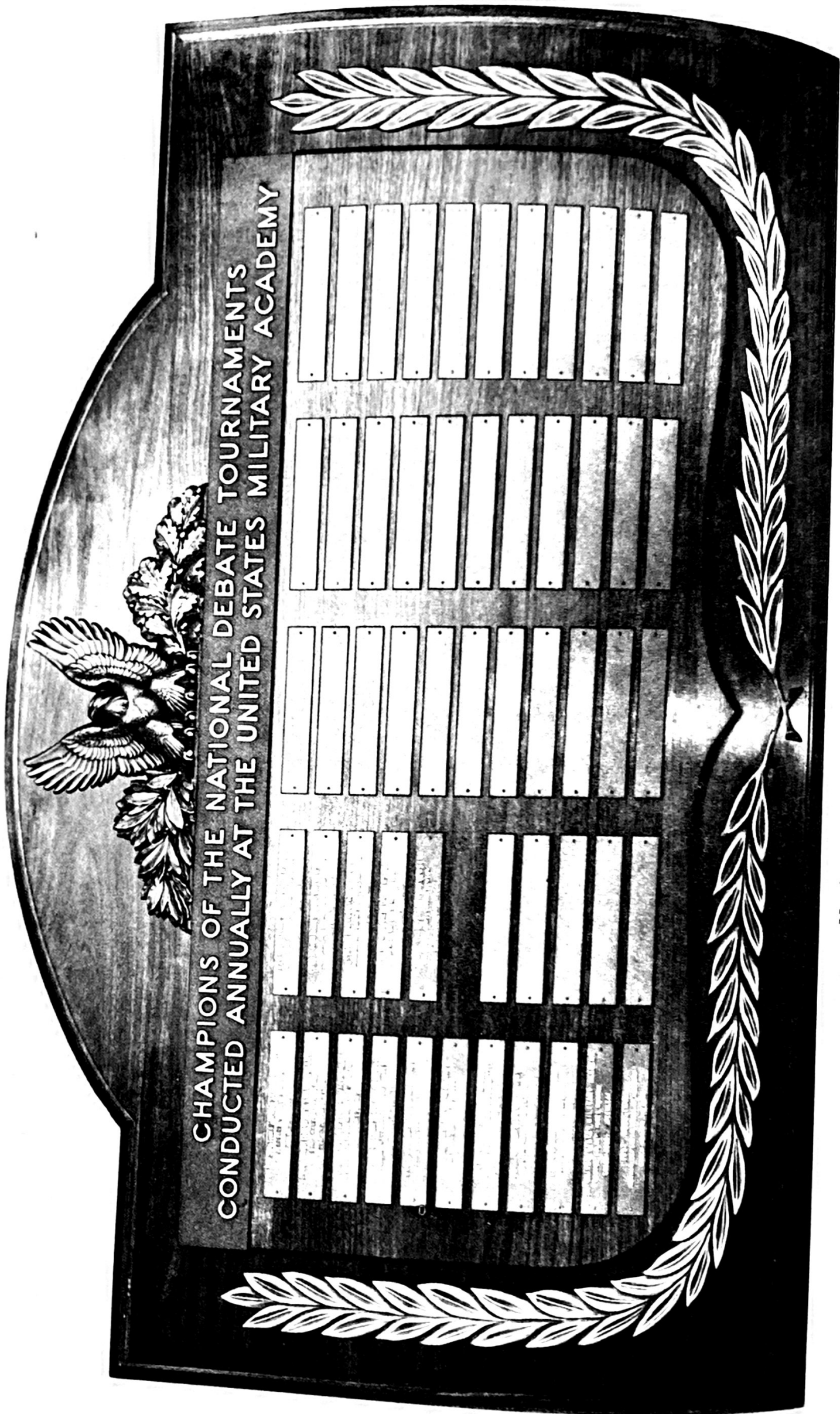

Commander, Europe, and Commander-in-Chief, U.S. European Command. General Norstad served with great distinction in these positions until his retirement from active military service on 1 January 1963.

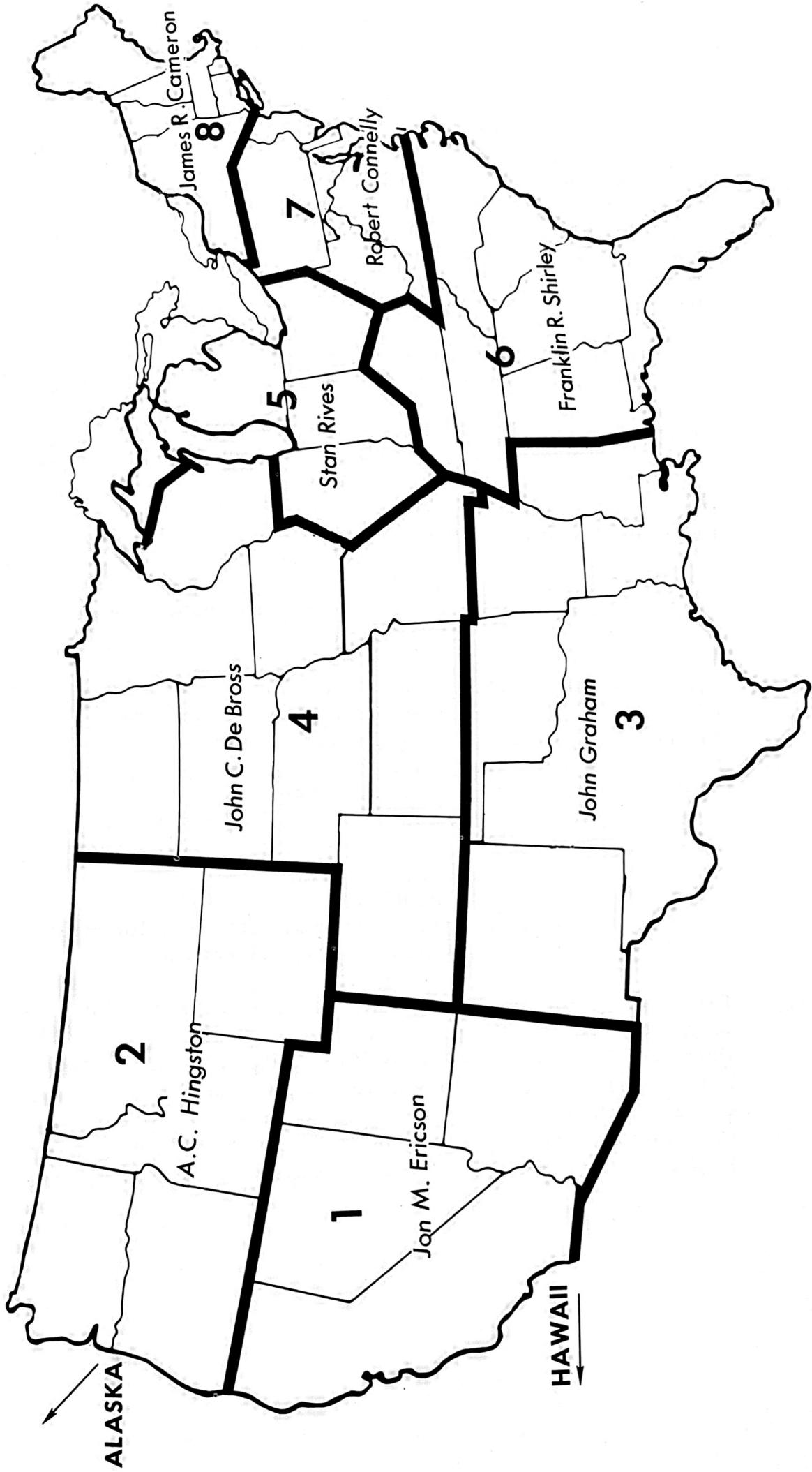
He was appointed Chairman of the Atlantic Council of the United States on 14 January 1963, and on 17 January was elected a director of Owens-Corning Fiberglas Corporation and named president of Owens-Corning Fiberglas International.

Born in Minneapolis, Minnesota on 24 March 1907, General Norstad graduated from the United States Military Academy in the Class of 1930 and was commissioned a second lieutenant of Cavalry.

Following graduation from Advanced Flying School, he was transferred to the Air Corps in June 1931. During World War II, he was assigned to the Europe-Africa area where he served until August 1944, when he returned to Washington. After occupying several positions of great importance in Washington, he was assigned to Europe in October 1950, as Commander-in-Chief, USAFE.

After his continued service in high staff and command positions in the Supreme Headquarters of the Allied Powers in Europe (SHAPE), the President on 20 November 1956, appointed General Norstad Supreme Allied

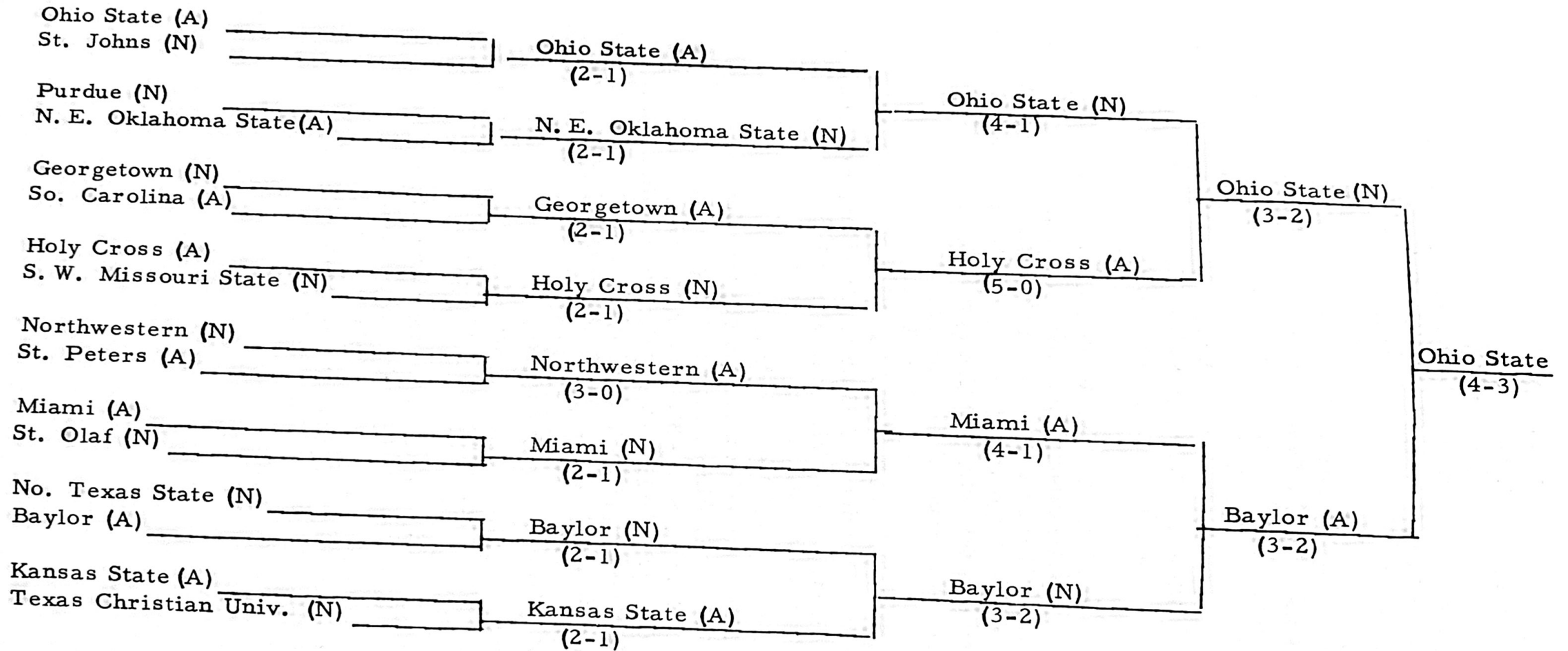

HISTORY

This Spring marks the seventeenth occasion that the foremost debate teams in the nation have travelled to West Point to compete for the Sigurd S. Larmon Trophy, the award emblematic of the national collegiate debating championship.

The idea of the Tournament at West Point evolved from two sources at about the same time. The accelerated program during the war years of 1941-1945 left little time for extracurricular activities, but when the curriculum was again expanded to four years, Cadet Tom Schwinn, chairman of the recently reestablished Debate Council arranged a small regional debate tournament. The success of this meeting encouraged the cadets to think in terms of a larger, more comprehensive tournament. Simultaneously, leaders in the debate community were considering the possibility of having a truly national tournament. The need, the location, and the level of interest gave the impetus necessary to transform the idea into the National Debate Tournament.

The ambition of the cadets and the interest of their collegiate associates probably would never have found form as a national tournament, however, had it not been for the aid and advice of such officers as General Maxwell D. Taylor, then Superintendent of the Military Academy, and Colonel G. A. Lincoln, the present Professor and Head of the Department of Social Sciences at West Point. The generous support and encouragement these and many other officers gave helped pave the way for the first National Tournament.

Administratively, little has changed in the Tournament's sixteen-year evolution. The nation is divided into eight areas by a mathematical scheme determined by the debate population. The selection of the regional representatives becomes the responsibility of the member schools of each region. In every part of the country leaders in the forensic field give their valuable time to perform the necessary pre-Tournament district tasks that enable them to bring outstanding debate teams together for this event.

This Spring, thirty-eight teams representing a cross section of the finest inter-collegiate debating in the country are again gathered at West Point. That the National Debate Tournament is truly national in scope is a testament to the labor of the debate community and to the skill and enthusiasm of the teams and coaches. For that reason, the names of the outstanding district committeemen, participating schools, and debaters are included in this program as an essential part of the history of this Tournament.

FINAL RESULTS

The Sixteenth National Debate Tournament was held at the United States Military Academy from 25-28 April inclusive. Thirty-eight teams from the eight national districts debated eight seeding rounds of strength versus strength pairings the first two days, and the top sixteen teams participated in four elimination rounds on the final day.

Ohio State University won the National Debate Tournament and became the possessor for one year of the Sigurd S. Larron Trophy. Debating the negative side of the national debate topic, Resolved, That Labor Organization Should be Under the Jurisdiction of Anti-Trust Legislation, Ohio State defeated Baylor University in the final round by a 4-3 vote. The Ohio State Team contributed a significant first to the sixteen year history of the Tournament by bringing to the winner's circle a representative of the nation's many female debaters, Miss Sarah Benson.

At the Tournament banquet, held after the completion of the eight seeding rounds, Dr. Nicolas M. Cripe, Professor and Head of the Department of Speech at Butler University, and National President of the American Forensics Association, delivered the principal address. Major General William C. Westmoreland, Superintendent of the United States Military Academy, presented the Lt. George W. P. Walker Memorial Awards of two Hamilton Electric Wrist Watches to the two speakers who had received the highest number of speakers' points in the eight seeding rounds, Lee Huebner of Northwestern and Harold Lawson of Kansas State Teacher's College (Emporia), who were tied for first place. The members of the two finalist teams, Sarah Benson and Dale Williams of Ohio State, and Calvin Kent and Mike Henke of Baylor, each received prize watches, designated the Hamilton Award, following the final debate. These watches were made available through the courtesy of the Hamilton Watch Company, Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

The sixteen teams entering the elimination rounds Saturday were selected on the following basis:

- First, on the number of debates won during the seeding rounds.
- Second, in case of ties, on the number of judges' votes received.
- Third, if a tie still existed, on total team points.

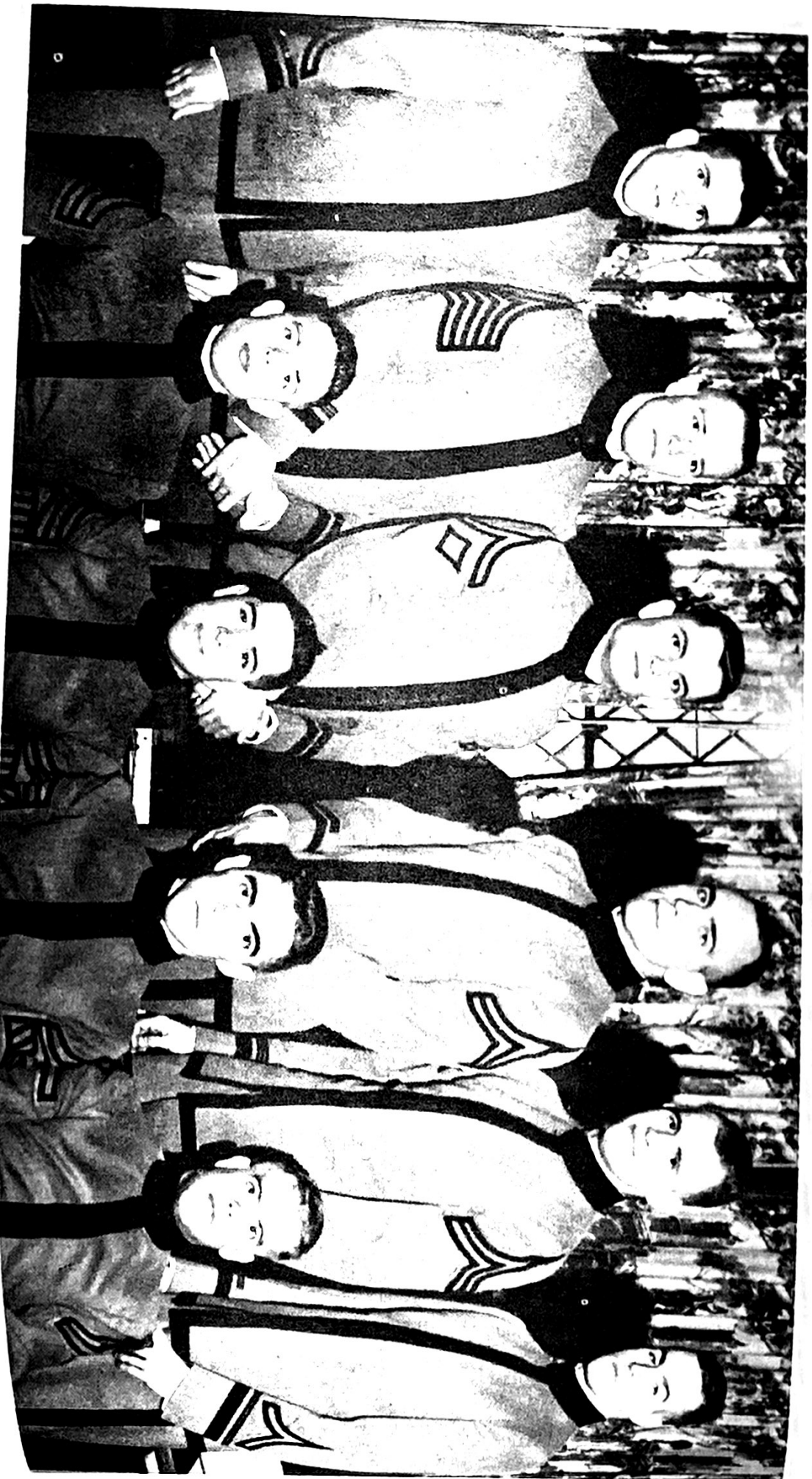

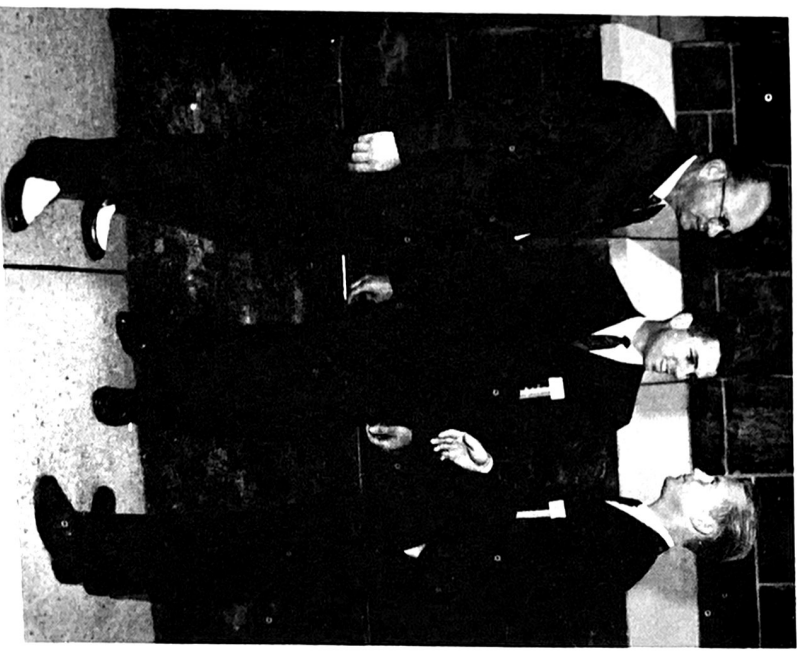
