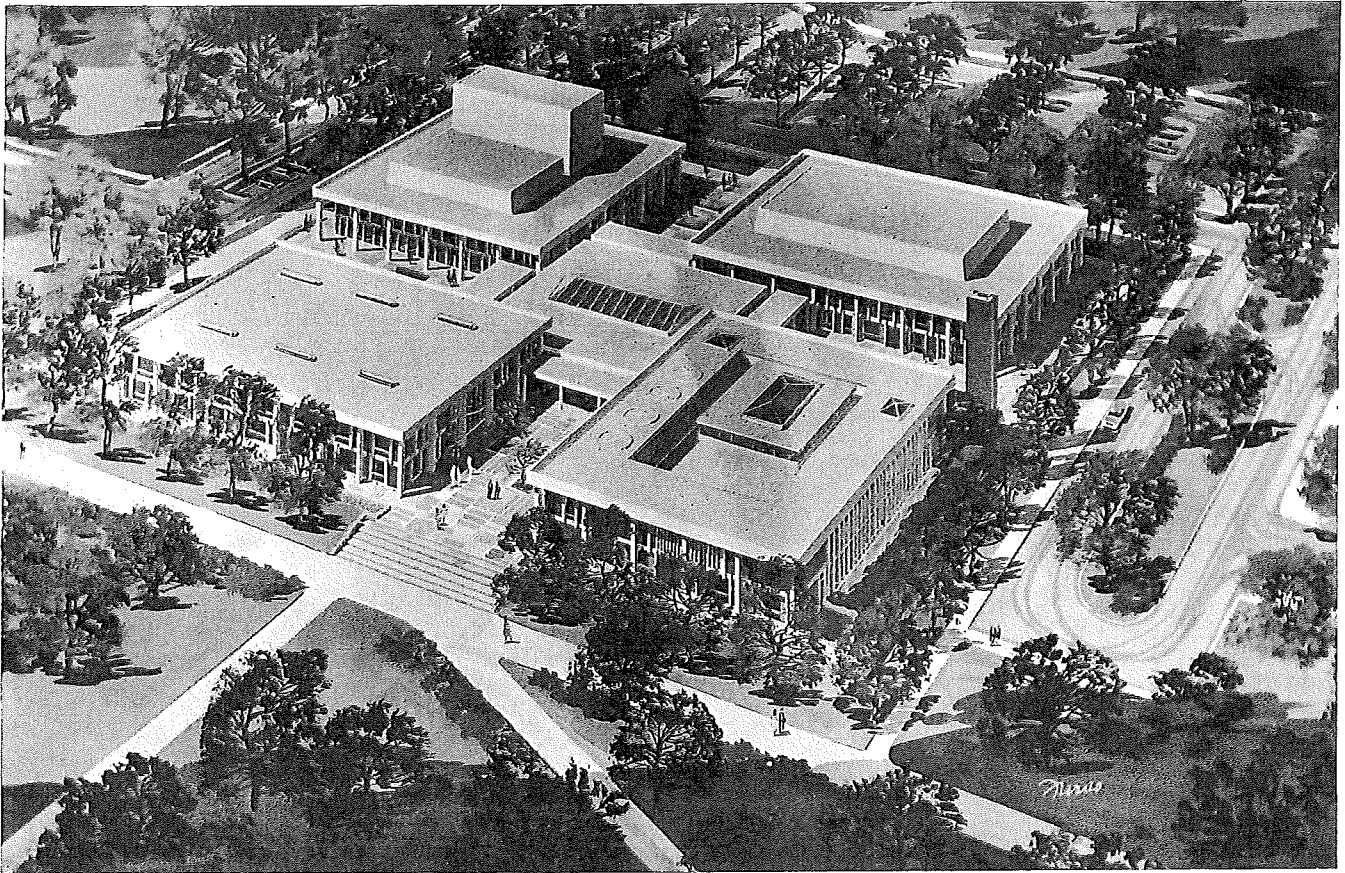


MEMORANDUM

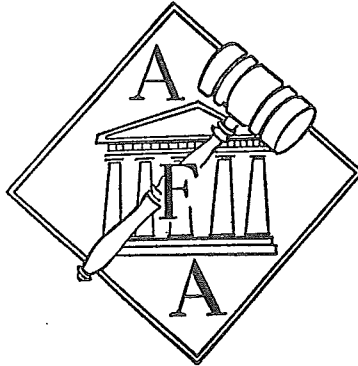


To All Participants in the

NATIONAL DEBATE TOURNAMENT: 1971

The Twenty-Fifth National Debate Tournament is sponsored by the American Forensic Association. District and National Committees have expended much time and effort to insure that this tournament reflects the highest quality debating throughout the nation.

Nine of the participants qualified this year by winning or debating in the final rounds of specially designated tournaments. Eight more teams were selected at-large by the National Debate Tournament Committee on the basis of outstanding records prior to the District Tournament. Twenty-seven additional teams representing all sections of the country were invited on the basis of their superior debating in District Tournaments. Finally, eight additional teams were selected by the National Committee on the basis of their season record, completing the tournament roster.

Guest judges, recommended by their District Committees and selected by the tournament director, will join coach judges, accompanying their teams, to staff three man judging panels in each round. The criticism and evaluation thus afforded should reflect the best balance and highest standards possible.

The first round will be matched by a pre-set schematic based upon the order in which teams qualified for the tournament. All other rounds will be paired on the basis of like records. Any team may be paired against any other team, and any judge may hear any team except his own. On the basis of records in the eight preliminary rounds, the top sixteen teams will be selected by win-loss record, total ballots, and total adjusted speaker points for elimination round competition culminating in the selection of the national championship debate team.

The National Debate Tournament and the American Forensic Association are grateful to Sigurd S. Larmon for donating the rotating Larmon trophy, emblematic of the national debate championship and to Mr. and Mrs. George Walker for donating the rotating second-place Walker Memorial Trophy.

Finally, we are most grateful to Scott Nobles, our tournament host, for his cooperation and assistance in making the numerous arrangements necessary for this tournament, and we are extremely indebted to President Flemming, Vice-President Dozier and the entire academic community of Macalester College for substantial support of this tournament--in finances, facilities, and personnel. Without these friends of debating, the Twenty-Fifth National Debate Tournament could not have taken place.

INSTRUCTIONS ON HOUSING, MEALS, AND DEBATES

Housing

Participants in the National Debate Tournament will be housed in the Twins and Midway Motor Inns. Reservations will be made by Macalester College, and each school will be responsible for paying its own bill. Guest judges will be given a check to cover the cost of their housing. Reservations will be made for Friday, Saturday, and Sunday evenings (April 16, 17, and 18) only, unless otherwise specified. Rates are figured on the assumption that guest judges and coaches will share a room.

Meals

Six meals are included for debaters, coaches, and guest judges in the registration fee. On Friday evening, Sunday evening, and Monday noon, the meals will be served in the Macalester Dining Commons. On Saturday noon, Saturday evening, and Sunday noon, the meals will be served in the Wallace Hall Cafeteria.

Debates

Most of the debates will be held in the Janet Wallace Fine Arts Center. A few will be held in adjacent Olin and Rice Halls. Debates will be announced at the times indicated on the schedule in the Concert Hall of the Janet Wallace Fine Arts Center. All debaters, coaches, and judges should report to the Concert Hall at the time indicated for each round to begin.

SPECIAL NOTE:

Coaches and guest judges are expected to be available for all rounds of debate through Monday Noon. It is hoped, of course, particularly in the case of guest judges, that judges will remain through all elimination rounds. No tournament results (ballots) will be released prior to the Semi-Final debate rounds.

DEBATE PROCEDURE AND INSTRUCTIONS

The American Forensic Association Form C debate ballot will be used for all debates. Judges are requested to follow the following instructions:

1. Please be sure that the names of the competing teams, the names of the debaters, and your name as the judge appear on the ballot.
2. Assign a speaker rating to each speaker. This speaker rating need not be a total of checked items (analysis, reasoning, etc.), but should follow the following guidelines:
 - 25-30 = superior
 - 19-24 = excellent
 - 13-18 = average
 - 7-12 = fair
 - 1- 6 = poor
3. Assign a speaker ranking to each speaker.
4. Award a decision, clearly specifying both institutional name and side of the winning team.
5. Sign your ballot, immediately detach the white front sheet from the ballot, enclose it in the envelope provided, and give it to the timekeeper who will return the sealed envelope to tournament headquarters for you. This white sheet will be used by the tournament staff in power-matching. Please take the remaining two sheets of the ballot and record your comments and reasons for decision; you should have about forty minutes for this purpose. When finished, seal your ballot in the second envelope provided and return it to the desk at the Concert Hall.
6. Do not announce any decision or reveal any decision to any person during the preliminary rounds of the tournament.

Each round of debate begins in the Janet Wallace Fine Arts Center at the time indicated. Debate team pairings and judging assignments will be announced according to lettered stations. As soon as the name of a debate team or judge is announced, that debate team or judge should report to the lettered station. The timekeeper should have the group leave for the appropriate room and start the debate as soon as all debaters and judges are present. Written notes on a debate are to be taken by no person other than the participating debaters and judges. Otherwise, observers are welcome to hear any debates during the tournament.

Timekeepers have been instructed to record time elapsed between speeches as well as to enforce the standard ten minute-five minute format. Timekeepers will announce time elapsed between speeches to judges and debaters prior to the beginning of the next speech in the debate. There will be no automatic five minute break between constructive and rebuttal speeches.

The preliminary rounds of debate will be power-matched as in previous years. In general, the following criteria will govern team matchings in the eight preliminary rounds:

1. No team debates the same team twice.
2. Teams debate four affirmative and four negative rounds, but do not necessarily alternate sides from round to round.
3. Teams are matched on a win-loss record, ballots, and speaker points.

The elimination rounds of the tournament will pair teams according to the following scheme: (numbers below represent rank in preliminary rounds)

Octafinals: 1-16, 2-15, 3-14, 4-13, 5-12, 6-11, 7-10, 8-9

Quarterfinals: winner of 1-16 vs. 8-9, of 2-15 vs. 7-10, of 3-14 vs. 6-11, and of 4-13 vs. 5-12

Semifinals: winner of 1-16-8-9 vs. 4-13-5-12 and of 2-15-7-10 vs. 3-14-6-11 with survivors meeting in the Finals.

In elimination round panel selection, coaches of opposing teams will be presented duplicate rosters of ten names (twelve names in the final round). Without consultation, each coach will indicate eight (ten in the final round) names acceptable to him as judges. From those names acceptable to both coaches, the NDT director will select the judging panel.

From the commencement of the rebuttal speeches in each elimination round until the chairman of the judging panel collects the ballots and opens the room, that room shall be closed and no one, except the coaches of the teams involved, shall be permitted to enter. The chairman of the panel will tally the ballots and announce the decision in the room.

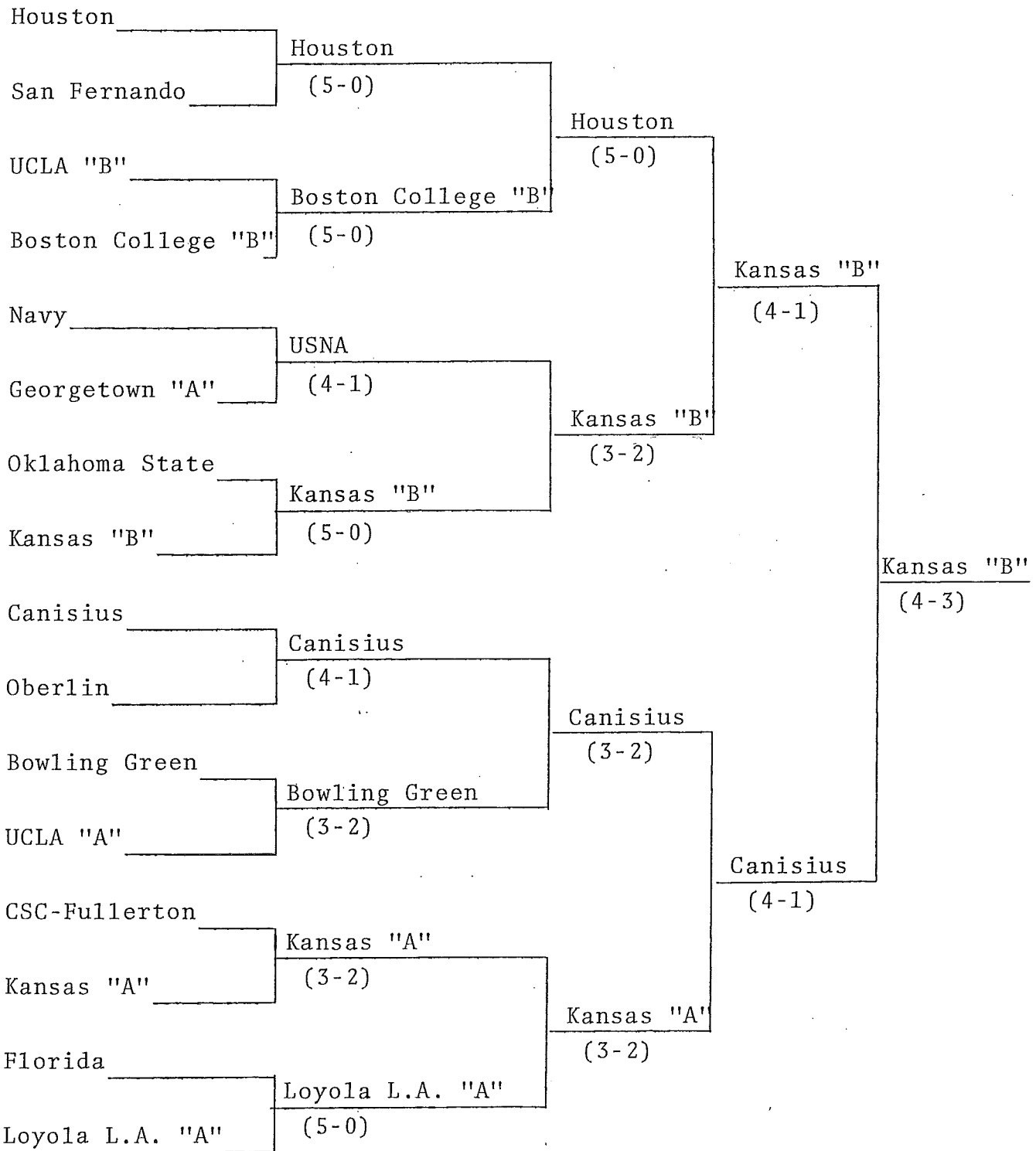

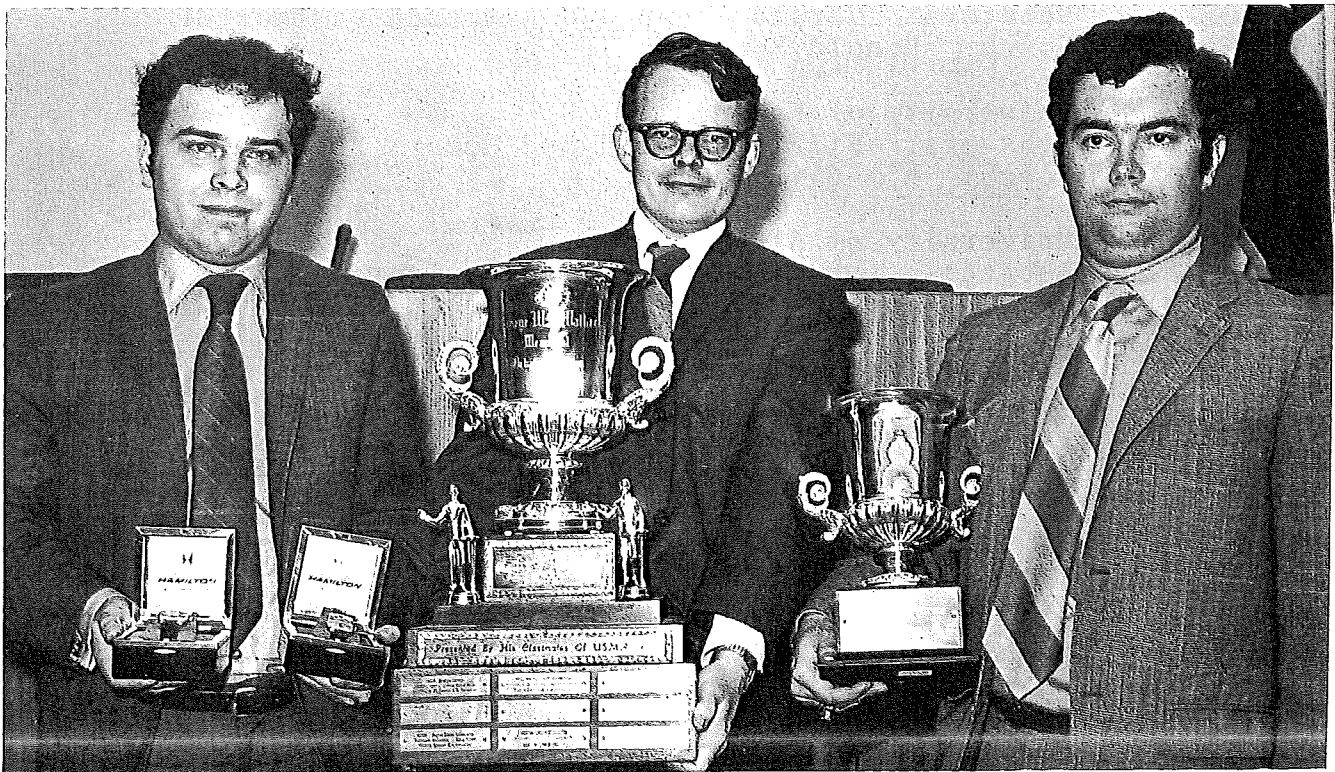

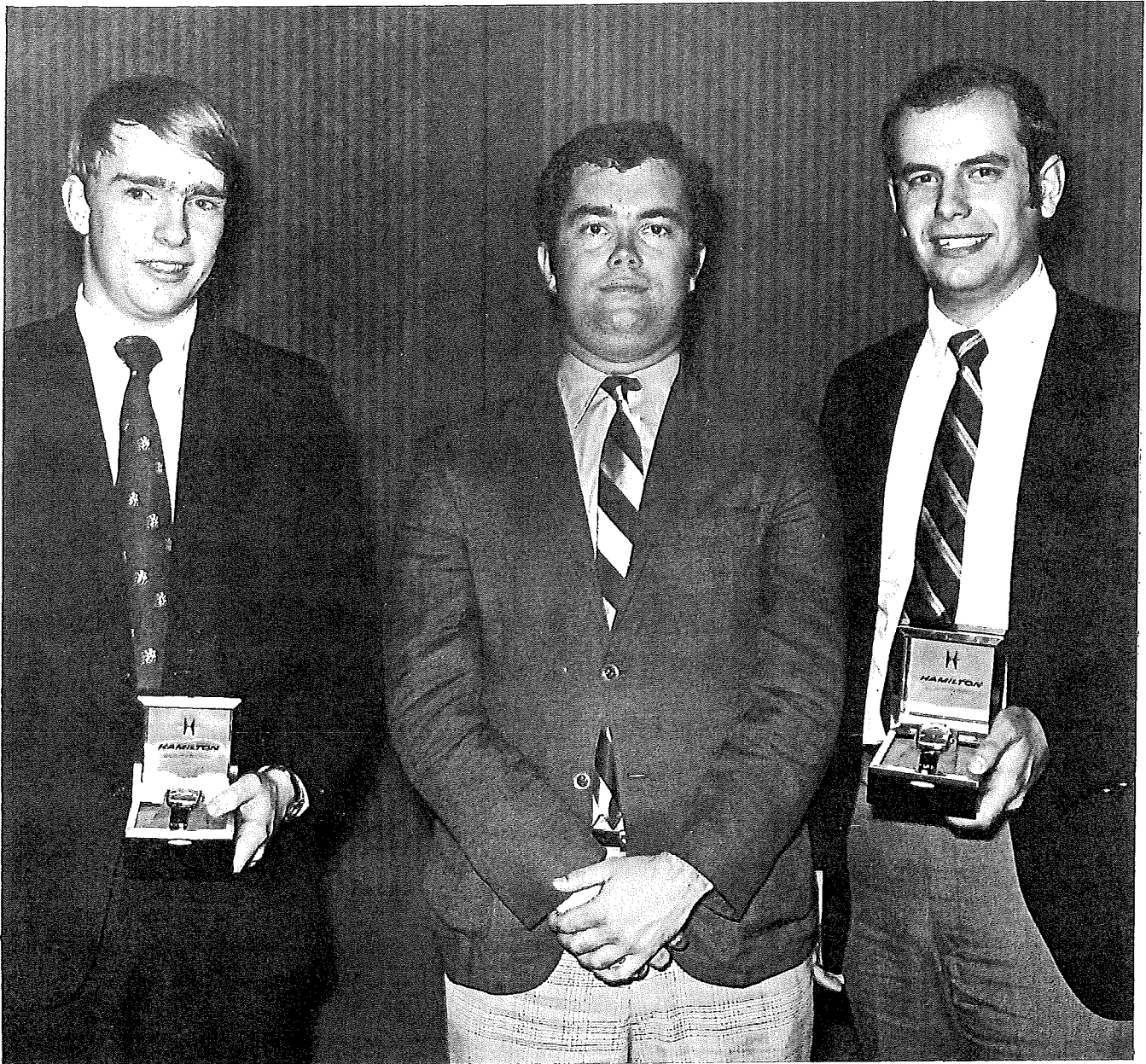
