THE GEORGE W. P. WALKER MEMORIAL TROPHY

For the past eleven years, the Military Education Foundation Trophy has been awarded each year to the second place team at the National Debate Tournament. During this period the trophy has literally traveled the width and breadth of the United States. Coincident with the retirement of the trophy this year, the sponsors of the National Debate Tournament have obtained the gracious approval of Mr. and Mrs. George Walker and the West Point Class of '58 to use the George W. P. Walker Memorial Trophy for the annual Second Place Team award.

Lt. George W. P. Walker was graduated number one in the United States Military Academy Class of 1958, and was killed in an aircraft accident on 31 January 1959. As a cadet he was an extremely effective debater, winning with now Captain James R. Murphy, USAF, the National Championship in 1956 and placing second in the national championship competition in 1957.


Since its donation in 1960 by his USMA classmates to the West Point Debate Council and Forum, the George W. P. Walker Memorial Trophy has been presented annually to the winner of the academy intramural debate competition. To use the trophy in National Debate Tournaments will be in keeping with Lt. ENTERTAINMENT

ORIENTATION AND GET-TOGETHER

At 8:00 p.m., Wednesday, 21 April, the cadet staff will give an orientation in the Tournament Headquarters, Lee Hall. Following this short presentation, all judges, coaches, and senior observers are invited to attend an informal reception in the West Point Army Mess (Officers' Club). All other participants are invited to remain at Lee Hall for an informal get-together. Refreshments will be available.

ACADEMY TOURS

There will be guided bus tours of West Point at 2:30 p.m. on Thursday, 22 April. The tour will begin in front of Lee Hall and will last approximately 45 minutes. Everyone will be back at Lee Hall in time to attend Debate Round 4 at 3:45 p.m.

BANQUET

On Friday at 7:00 p.m., the Debate Tournament Banquet will be held at the West Point Army Mess (Officers' Club). Awards to top individual speakers will be presented and the names of the 16 finalist teams will be announced. Entertainment will be provided by the Post Orchestra and the Cadet Glee Club.

COMPUTER CENTER TOUR

A tour of the Computer Center has been arranged for all participants, judges, and coaches anytime after 10:30 a.m., Saturday. Guides will leave from the Information Desk in Lee Hall.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON ACTIVITIES

At noon, Saturday, there will be a parade by the U.S. Corps of Cadets. All interested may attend. The location will be announced in Lee Hall Saturday morning. Following the parade, there will be several athletic events which are open to all. A schedule of these events can be obtained at the Information Desk in Lee Hall.

HOUSING

- 1. All participants will reside at the U.S. Hotel Thayer, located on post at West Point, during the Tournament.
- 2. The Debate Council will pay housing expenses for all guest judges, coaches, and debaters. The Debate Council is not authorized to incur any expenses for the wives, families, or guests of participants.
- 3. Because of the limited space available, all participants <u>must</u> check out on Saturday, 24 April, before leaving the hotel to attend the debates for that day. Reservations for participants who desire to stay at the Hotel Thayer over the weekend must be made on an individual basis as early as possible after arriving at West Point. Everyone will check out on an individual basis, even though his bill is being paid entirely or in part by the Debate Council.
- 4. The Hotel will be happy to check all bags and belongings for participants who check out and attend the final debates on Saturday. It is urged that visitors concerned check their bags at the Hotel inasmuch as storage facilities are limited at the central part of the post.
- 5. The Hotel will be happy to call anyone at a certain hour if desired. Please notify the clerk at the main desk in the Hotel lobby upon arrival if you desire to rise at a specific time.

PARKING

During daylight hours facilities in the central part of the post, particularly near Tournament Headquarters, are extremely limited. Those participants staying at the Hotel Thayer are requested to park their cars at the hotel and utilize tournament transportation. Participants will not be authorized to leave their cars in the lot adjacent to Tournament Headquarters during daylight hours. Your cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

TRANSPORTATION

Shuttle transportation has been arranged for you during your stay at West Point. Bus transportation has been scheduled for those times when participants will be going to meals, debates, and other functions occurring during the course of the tournament. Sedan service will be provided at other times between 6:00 a.m. and 10:30 p.m. on call from Lee Hall. Commercial taxi service for both on and off-post use is available. Shuttle buses will operate continually between hours indicated.

DINING

- l. All male debaters will eat in the Cadet Dining Hall at the times prescribed below. They will be seated in groups of eight with two Cadet Escorts at tables provided in a section of the Cadet Dining Hall reserved for Debate Tournament participants. Prior to the meals, debaters will assemble in Lee Hall where they will meet their escorts.
- 2. The hours for meals in the Cadet Dining Hall (Washington Hall) are as follows: Breakfast 6:45 AM; Dinner 12:10 PM; Supper 6:15 PM.
- 3. Provisions have been made for all senior participants, judges, coaches, and women debaters to take their meals at the West Point Army Mess (Officers' Club) for dinner and supper, and in the Main Dining Room of the Hotel Thayer for breakfast only. To facilitate the keeping of records by the Officers' Club, the Hotel Thayer, and the West Point Debate Council, diners will sign both their name and the name of their school to their checks at the beginning of each meal. Observers, guests, children, and all other non-participants in the Tournament are authorized to dine at the Officers' Club and will pay in cash at each meal. Cadet escorts will accompany participants to the Officers' Club daily for all meals excluding breakfast. Male debaters eat all meals in Washington Hall.
- 4. The hours for meals in the Officers¹ Club and Hotel Thayer Dining Room are as follows:

Breakfast 6:45 AM to 7:30 AM (Hotel Thayer)
Dinner 11:30 AM to 1:00 PM
Supper 6:00 PM to 7:30 PM

- 5. Participants are urged to arrange their schedules in order to meet their Tournament commitments.
- 6. All senior participants, coaches and judges have been extended a temporary membership in the West Point Officers' Club. All expenses other than scheduled meals must be paid by the individual in cash at the Officers' Club. All senior members are invited to take advantage of the facilities provided by the Club.
 - 7. All participants are asked to wear their identification cards at all times.

DEBATE PROCEDURES AND JUDGING INSTRUCTIONS

- over the public address system, please report to the indicated lettered station. Indications of these stations will be found placed on the walls of Lee Hall. The Cadet Escort of the debate will meet the teams and judges at the lettered station and will conduct them to the room where the debate will take place. To facilitate the administration of this tournament, everyone should be present at Lee Hall a half hour before the time of the debate round, and should report promptly to his lettered station when requested to do so over the public address system.
- 2. At the conclusion of each seeding debate, the Cadet Escort will present the judges a ballot and an electrographic pencil. Each ballot consists of two cards -- one WHITE and one PINK. The WHITE card is for the AFFIRMATIVE team; the PINK card is for the NEGATIVE team. The right side of the card will have been completed by the Cadet Escort. Judges should not make any marks on this side of the card. When the ballot cards have been completed, the Cadet Escort will check them and transcribe the decision and point scores to a "record ballot" (a more orthodox, easily readable ballot). Judges will then be asked to sign BOTH the ballot cards and the "record ballot" with the pen provided by the Cadet Escort (pencil signatures on the ballot cards would upset the computer!). Ballot cards will be delivered immediately to the Computer Center. The "record ballot" will be placed in an envelope, sealed by the Cadet Escort, and delivered immediately to the Statistics Room.
- 3. Cadet Escorts are forbidden to discuss with anyone decisions of which they have knowledge. JUDGES SHOULD NOT ANNOUNCE THEIR DECISION TO ANY PERSON DURING THE SEEDING ROUNDS. The final team ratings will be announced at the banquet following the completion of the eighth round. We also ask that the judges do not give oral critiques. Should you desire to convey comments to the debaters regarding the debate, we ask that you do so on the critique sheets which will be provided you.
- 4. At the conclusion of each elimination debate, judges will record their decision on the "record ballot" only. The forms will be placed in an envelope, sealed by the Cadet Escort, and delivered immediately to the Statistics Room.
- 5. On Saturday morning all Tournament personnel should report to Lee Hall prior to the time for the semi-final round. As soon as judges have been obtained, all eliminated teams may leave.

TEAM MATCHING AND JUDGE SELECTION

Because of the close time schedule required to complete all debates, it is requested that all participants, judges, and faculty members refrain from visiting the Computer Center. In the interest of expediency and fairness, statisticians will not be allowed to give information to anyone. Persons desiring to visit the Computer Center are invited to do so after 10:30 AM on Saturday, 24 April.

In general, these rules will govern team matchings in the eight seeding rounds:

- 1. No team debates the same team twice.
- 2. No team debates a team from its own district.
- 3. Teams debate opposite sides of the question an equal number of times.
- 4. Teams debate alternate sides from round to round.
- 5. Teams are matched according to win-loss record.

Criteria for assigning judges are as follows:

- 1. No coach will judge a team from his own district.
- 2. No judge will judge the same team twice, unless absolutely necessary, and then on the opposite side.
- 3. If it is necessary to assign one judge instead of three:
 - a. Teams with the best record are given three judges.
 - b. A team may be required to have a single judge only twice.

INSTRUCTIONS TO JUDGES - INDIVIDUAL DEBATER RATINGS

1. Use the following point scale:

Superior 50-41 Excellent 40-31 Good 30-21

No rating should be given below 21, it being assumed that any debater who is representing a district is at least above the average.

2. Rate each individual debater using the following criteria:

How good a job of debating did this speaker do in this debate?

Consider:

a. Teamwork and Courtesy

b. Analysis

c. Organization

d. Logic

e. Evidence

f. Adaptation (flexibility)

g. Refutation

h. Delivery

i. Clarity

j. Knowledge of question

The debater who most effectively fills the above criteria should receive the highest score for this debate, but not necessarily 50 points.

3. Please do not make any critiques or discuss your decision with anyone until after the top sixteen teams are announced at the Tournament Banquet.

INSTRUCTIONS TO JUDGES - TEAM RATINGS

1. Use the following point scale:

Superior 50-41 Excellent 40-31 Good 30-21

No rating should be given below 21, it being assumed that any team representing a district is at least above the average.

2. Rate Each Team using the following criteria:


Which TEAM did the better job of debating, AS A TEAM? Consider:

- g. Refutation h. Delivery

The team which most effectively fills the above criteria should receive the highest score and win the debate. This score is not necessarily 50 points.

3. The team with the highest total of individual debater's points does not necessarily have to win the debate. Consider only the effectiveness of the team as a whole in making your decision.

Mr. Patrick Healy, Director, Community Relations, of the Job Corps is responsible for choosing sites near communities which wish to have a close relationship with Job Corpsmen and the Job Corps centers, and for developing strong and continuing relations between Job Corps centers and the communities near them. Mr. Healy has been with the Job Corps program since the organization of the President's Task Force on the War Against Poverty, and was, until recently, in charge of planning and administering the Job Corps Conservation Centers located on Federal lands.

He was born in Chicago, Illinois, and received his A.B. degree (1949) and M.B.A. (1951) from Harvard. Prior to joining Government service he was Director of Media Relations and Planning for Young & Rubicam, Inc. in San Francisco.

He entered the U.S. Army in 1943 and was discharged as a Sergeant in 1946, after participating in both the European and Pacific campaigns. He was a First Lieutenant during the Korean Conflict.





HISTORY OF NATIONAL DEBATE TOURNAMENT

HISTORY

This spring, forty of the nation's best debate teams will compete for the highly coveted Sigurd S. Larmon Trophy, symbol of debating excellence and the prize emblematic of the National Collegiate Debating Championship.

This tournament, conducted annually for the past eighteen years, has a dual origin. The accelerated curriculum during the war years of 1941-1945 left little time for extracurricular activities. The close of the war saw the curriculum again expanded to four years, and the debate council reestablished. In 1946 chairman Cadet Tom Schwinn arranged for a small regional debate tournament.

The ambition of the cadets and the interest of their collegiate associates probably would never have found form as a National Tournament, however, had it not been for the aid and advice of such officers as General Maxwell D. Taylor, then Superintendent of the Military Academy, and Colonel G.A. Lincoln, the present Professor and Head of the Department of Social Sciences at West Point. The generous support and encouragement these and many other officers gave helped pave the way for the first National Tournament.

Administratively, little has changed in the Tournament's eighteen year evolution. The Nation is divided into eight Regional Districts, and the selection of the Regional Representatives is the responsibility of the member schools in that particular region. In every part of the country, leaders in the debate field give their valuable time to perform the necessary pre-tournament tasks at the district level in order to bring the country's outstanding debate teams together for this event.

The teams representing the finest intercollegiate debating in the country are again gathered at West Point. That the National Debate Tournament is truly national in scope is a testament to the labor of the debate community and to the skill and enthusiasm of the teams and coaches. For this reason, the names of the outstanding district committeemen, participating schools, and debaters are included in this program as an essential part of the history of this tournament.

FINAL RESULTS

Thirty-eight teams from the eight national districts debated eight seeding rounds of strength versus strength pairings the first two days of the Tournament, and the top sixteen teams participated in four elimination rounds on the final day.

The University of the Pacific won the National Debate Tournament and became the possessor for one year of the Sigurd S. Larmon Trophy. Debating the negative side of the national debate topic, University of the Pacific defeated Boston College in the Championship Round by a 4-3 vote.

At the Tournament banquet, held after the completion of the eight seeding rounds, Dr. Edward L. Katzenbach, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Education, delivered the principal address. Major General James B. Lampert, Superintendent of the United States Military Academy, presented the Lt. George W. P. Walker Memorial Awards of two Hamilton Electric Wrist Watches to the two speakers who had received the highest number of speakers' points in the eight seeding rounds: Robert E. Roberts of the University of Alabama, first place, and John Hempelmann of Georgetown University, second place. The members of the two finalist teams, Raoul Kennedy and Douglas Pipes of University of the Pacific, and Joseph McLaughlin and James Unger of Boston College, each received prize electric watches, designated the Hamilton Award, following the final debate. These watches were made available through the generosity of the Hamilton Watch Company, Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

The sixteen teams entering the elimination rounds Saturday were selected on the following basis:

First, on the number of debates won during the seeding rounds.

Second, in case of ties, on the number of judges' votes received.

Third, if a tie still existed on the number of team points received.




