THE PRESENT

The Twenty-First National Debate Tournament is sponsored by the American Forensic Association and co-hosted by Northwestern University and the University of Chicago. Both institutions have been generous in their support of the NDT.

Eight district tournaments have been held throughout the nation to determine the participants in this national final tournament. The thirty-eight teams participating in this event have thus earned the right to represent their geographical district in national competition. The National Debate Tournament begins with eight rounds of debate for all thirty-eight participating teams. On the basis of records in these preliminary rounds, the top sixteen teams are selected for elimination round competition which culminates in the selection of a national championship debating team.

The National Debate Tournament and the American Forensic Association are grateful to the Hamilton Watch Company of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, for the Hamilton Awards, the six Hamilton Electric Wrist Watches given to the two top speakers in the preliminary rounds and the four speakers in the final debate; to Sigurd S. 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INSTRUCTIONS ON HOUSING AND MEALS AND DEBATES

Housing

All participants in the National Debate Tournament will be housed in the Center for Continuing Education. <u>All NDT participants must be checked out</u> of their rooms at the Center by 3 PM on Wednesday, <u>April 19</u>. Each school or individual is responsible for payment of the housing bill directly with the Center upon check-out. The cost of housing has been deducted from the registration fee for participating schools (the registration fee was set at \$93 for each participating school, but reduced to \$21 to allow for each school to handle its own housing bill directly with the Center). Guest judges for whom housing is being provided will be given a check to cover the cost of their housing. Please cooperate with the Center by checking out prior to 3 PM on Wednesday. Those who have automobiles will find a fee parking lot directly behind the Center.

Meals

The Cafeteria in the Center will be open from 7 AM until 4 PM for coffee and snacks throughout the tournament. Those who desire breakfast will also find it available in the Center Cafeteria. Note that the tournament provides no breakfasts for participants. Participating debaters, coaches, and guest judges for whom meals are being provided will dine together in the Center Dining Room at the following times:

> Sunday at 6 PM Monday at 11:45 AM and 6 PM Tuesday at 11:45 AM and 7 PM (tournament banquet) Wednesday at 11:45 PM

Other persons who have not pre-paid for meals will find food service available on a cost basis in either the Center Cafeteria or a section of the Dining Room. <u>Persons eating with the NDT group must have</u> identification badges to be served.

Debates

Most of the preliminary rounds of debate will be in the Center for Continuing Education. A few debates, however, will be held in Ida Noyes Hall. All of the elimination round debates on Wednesday will be in the Center. Debates will be announced at the times indicated on the schedule in the Assembly Room of the Center. <u>All debaters</u>, <u>coaches</u>, and judges should report to the Assembly Room at the time indicated for each round to begin.

<u>SPECIAL NOTE</u>: Coaches and judges are expected to be available for all rounds of debate including the elimination rounds on Wednesday. Coaches of teams that do not qualify for the elimination rounds should nevertheless be available for judging assignments in the elimination rounds. <u>Absolutely no tournament results (ballots) will be released</u> prior to 1 PM on Wednesday.

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DEBATE PROCEDURE AND INSTRUCTIONS

The American Forensic Association Form C debate ballot (see opposite page) will be used for all debates. Judges are requested to follow the following instructions:

1. <u>Assign a speaker rating to each speaker</u>. This speaker rating need <u>not</u> be a total of checked items (analysis, reasoning, etc.), but should follow the following guidelines:

25-30 = superior 19-24 = excellent 13-18 = average

7-12 = fair

1-6 = poor

2. Do not announce any decision or reveal any decision to any person during the preliminary rounds of the tournament.

3. Seal your ballot and give it to the timekeeper after the round is completed. The timekeeper will return the ballot to tournament headquarters for you. <u>Because the tournament is power-matched</u>, and because <u>limited time is available for this power-matching</u>, <u>please return your</u> <u>ballot to the timekeeper within five minutes of the time the round is</u> <u>completed</u>. Lengthy criticques may be written independent of the ballot and turned into tournament headquarters later.

4. Please, please be sure that the names of the competing teams, the names of the debaters, the decision, and your name as the judge appear on the ballot. It is not considered unethical to give the decision to the team which wins the debate!

Each round of debate begins in the Assembly Room of the Center at the time indicated. Debate team pairings and juding assignments will be announced according to lettered stations. As soon as the name of a debate team or judge is announced, that debate team or judge should report to the lettered station. The timekeeper should have the group leave for the appropriate room and start the debate as soon as all debaters and judges are present. Written notes on a debate are to be taken by no person other than the participating debaters and judges. Otherwise, observers are welcome to hear any debates during the tournament.

The preliminary rounds of debate will be power-matched as in previous years. In general, the following criteria will govern team matchings in the eight preliminary rounds:

- 1. No team debates the same team twice.
- 2. No team debates a team from its own district.
- 3. Teams debate four affirmative and four negative rounds, but do not necessarily alternate sides from round to round.
- 4. Teams are matched on a win-loss record.

The elimination rounds of the tournament will pair teams according to the following scheme: (numbers below represent rank in preliminary rounds)

Octafinals: 1-16, 2-15, 3-14, 4-13, 5-12, 6-11, 7-10, 8-9

Quarterfinals: winner of 1-16 vs. 8-9, of 5-12 vs. 3-14, of 2-15 vs. 6-11, and of 4-13 vs. 7-10

Semifinals: winner of 1-16-8-9 vs. 5-12-3-14, and winner of 2-15-6-11 vs. 4-13-7-10 with survivors meeting in the Finals.

No results (ballots) will be released until after 1 PM on Wednesday. All judges are expected to be available for all rounds of debate.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE NATIONAL DEBATE TOURNAMENT

Thirty-eight of the nation's finest debate teams compete at the University of Chicago this year for the coveted Sigurd S. Larmon trophy, symbol of debating excellence and the prize emblematic of the National Collegiate Debating Championship. This year marks the twenty-first renewal of this competition. This year is also the first year that the tournament is not being held at the United States Military Academy at West Point.

The National Debate Tournament had its origin at the Military Academy shortly after World War II when the debate council was reestablished. A small regional debate tournament was begun at West Point in 1946. The cadets were encouraged in their aspirations for a national tournament by such officers as General Maxwell D. Taylor, then Superintendent of the Military Academy, and Colonel George Lincoln, present Head of the Department of Social Sciences at West Point. The first National Debate Tournament was held at West Point in 1947. Over the years, a tradition of excellence has come to be associated with the NDT. It has come to be accepted in the forensic community as the "national final" debate tournament. The forensic community owes much to the United States Military Academy for initiating and maintaining the National Debate Tournament during the first twenty years.

The NDT is now sponsored by the American Forensic Association. This affiliation was completed at the AFA meetings at the Speech Association of America convention in December, 1966. The Twenty-First NDT was planned by a committee under the leadership of George Ziegelmueller, AFA President, consisting of the immediate past and current district chairmen. The tradition established at the Military Academy continues under the American Forensic Association.
