# The National Debate Tournament

The National Debate Tournament began at the United States Military Academy in 1947. It was organized and conducted by the academy at West Point for its first twenty years. Initial tournament rules were determined by the West Point Administration in consultation with such debate coaches as A. Craig Baird of the University of Iowa, G. M. Musgrave of Des Moines, Alan Nichols of USC, E. R. Nichols of the University of Redlands, and Joseph O'Brien of Pennsylvania State University.

At the first tournament in 1947, twenty-nine colleges participated in five "seeding" rounds and four elimination rounds over a three day period. Some of the features of the tournament were that no school would meet a school within five hundred miles of itself during the seeding rounds and that no coach would judge a school from his or her own district. Many traditions were started at West Point that year, some of which still remain today: the "big board", oral announcement of round pairings, cadet escorts for each team, teams for each debate meeting under the banner of the affirmative team, and team signs in the rooms.

In 1967, the National Debate Tournament entered a new era as the American Forensic Association, the national professional organization of forensics educators, assumed responsibility for the tournament. The NDT was moved from West Point and has been hosted by a different school every year since. Control of the tournament became the responsibility of a national committee elected by those schools supporting the tournament. As debate has developed in recent years other refinements have been added to the tournament: the ten-minute preparation time rule, elaborate procedures for assigning judges, and judge qualifications.

Over the years, the tournament has expanded in size, with various procedures used for selecting the participants. In the early days, teams were chosen by district nominating committees. This method was replaced by some form of qualifying tournaments in most districts. For the first twenty years of NDT competition, the tournament host and previous year's winner received automatic invitations. Post-district at-large bids were initiated in 1968 and predistrict bids in 1971. Since 1970, it has been possible for a school to qualify as many as two teams for the NDT. This year seventy-two teams participated in the NDT.

The Forty-fifth National Debate Tournament was sponsored by the American Forensic Association with support from the Ford Motor Company Fund. The NDT is also indebted to Mr. Siguard S. Larmon (1891-1987) for donating the rotating Larmon Trophy, emblematic of the national debate championship; to Mr. and Mrs. George Walker for donating the rotating second-place Walker Memorial; to Robert Feldhake, for donating the Wayne Brockriede Top Speaker Watch; and to a most generous individual, who wishes to remain anonymous, for a \$5,000 contribution for the rotating First Speaker Tifany Bowl. The 1991 NDT saw the unveiling of the REX COPELAND FIRST BID AWARD, a magnificent pyramid like trophy with all the previous top bids engraved. The NDT is also indebted to many other alumni who have contributed over the past few years since the formulation of the NDT Alumni Association. One person in particular, Mr. Donald Herrick (top speaker at the 1960 NDT from William-Jewel College), was responsible for the revival of this publication in 1988.

District and national committees expended considerable time and effort to insure that the tournament reflects the highest quality debating throughout the nation. Sixteen teams were selected at-large by the National Debate Tour nament Committee on the basis of outstanding records prior to the District Tournaments. Forty-one teams representing the eight Districts were invited on the basis of their superior debating in District Tournaments. Fifteen additional teams were selected by the National Committee on an at-large basis after the District Tournaments.

All teams with minimum preliminary round 5-3 records, and 13 or more ballots, participated in the elimination rounds. Seeding was determined by win-loss records, total ballots, and adjusted team points after dropping high and low. The first elimination round featured a partial bracket so that sixteen teams remained after its conclusion, a format that the National Committee enacted for the 1987 NDT. Four subsequent elimination rounds culminated in the selection of one team as the national champion. Awards are given to the outstanding individual speakers after the eight rounds of preliminary competition.

The 1991 Final Round came as no surprise. After all it had occurred nine times previously during the year, most recently in Round III of the NDT itself. Redlands ended the year with a 7-3 edge, but had contributed mightily to Michigan's growing reputation by losing the first three times the two teams debated. The final atlarge voting certainly proved a sound predictor of the NDT itself with Redlands ranking First, Dartmouth Second and Michigan Third. Iowa's inclusion among the final four in the semis was also predictable. They had been red-hot in the second semester, garnering numerous semi-final regular tournament slots and equally frequent speaker awards. The 1990-91 season also saw numerous team changes, many of which substantially influenced the year's results. Alex Lennon, the defending National Champion, retired in mid-season, leaving Harvard with a respectable team but not a national challenger. The Unversity of Texas top team of Derek Jinks and Ryan Goodman retired after a final round loss at Wake Forest. Emory University also made some team changes, producing Darren Summerville and Jeffrey Richardson who promptly reached the final round of West Georgia and the quarter-finals of the NDT. Perhaps the most significant change occurred early in the year with Scott Groussman's retirement and Neal Katyal and Ken Agran's emergence as Dartmouth's top team. After a defeat in the quarter finals at Wake Forest, Katyal and Agran launched a streak in which they won forty of forty-two debates, losing only two affirmative debates, both to Redlands. Many more such episodes could be related.

The 1990-91 Debate Topic, Resolved: THAT THE UNITED STATES SHOULD SUBSTANTIALLY CHANGE ITS TRADE POLICY TOWARD ONE OR MORE OF THE FOLLOWING: CHINA, HONG KONG, JAPAN, SOUTH KOREA, TAIWAN, ranged considerably broader than its geographic limitations might suggest. Indeed, at the NDT new affirmatives abounded and they contributed heavily to the upset of five top seeds in the nine debates of the first elimination round. Longer term, the most popular interpretations were banning U.S. bilateral pressures on Japan in order to avoid a rebirth of Japanese Nationalism and its resulting trade wars and re-armament. That particular approach was run by both Michigan and Kentucky for most of the year with considerable success. Dartmouth advanced a case requiring warning labels be placed on all U.S. exported tobacco products, claiming an amazing potential seventy-million lives saved. Redlands and Iowa both opened our trade restrictions to China, hopefully creating a more stable economic situation in that troubled nation. Of course, there were many,

many, many others. Emory produced something new every tournament, starting with banning export of "old growth trees" to "bear parts" and much else in between. The laundry list of cases for which preparation was required included every product imported or exported to the five nations. Accordingly, safety measures

for Taiwanese fire crackers to illegally imported heroin from Hong Kong became fair game. Moreover, the recency of the issues required incredible updating and examination of the most recent newspaper and trade journals. Suffice to say this was a most educational season, one in which "research" had real meaning.



# Top Speaker

T.A. McKinney concluded his national collegiate debate career in identical fashion to its commencement. In 1988, at the National Novice Debate Tournament, he was named outstanding individual speaker. Three years later, he once again emerged from his class at the 1991 National Debate Tournament as the Best Debater in the country. During his four years at the University of Kentucky, T.A. never failed to reach the elimination rounds at any tournament he attended, including four NDT's. He concluded last season with Fifth Place individual rank at the 1990 NDT. This year during the 1990-91 season, he ranked in the top five at virtually every tournament he attended. Including Third Speaker at the Kentucky Round-Robin, Miami of Ohio; Second Speaker at Northern Iowa and Kansas; First Speaker awards at Wake Forest, Dartmouth and the National Debate Tournament.

T.A.'s forensic accomplishments in April were well

matched by his academic dominance in May. President of Omicron Delta Kappa, T.A. graduated with Highest Distinction (the equivalent to Summa Cum Laude), Phi Beta Kappa and the Vanen Bosch Award as Outstanding Political Science student at Kentucky. Before attending either Harvard or Columbia Law School, he will utilize a full year's respite as a Policy Analyst for the International SWAP Dealers Association in New York City.

A two-time Debate Qualifier for NFL Nationals while debating at Montgomery Bell Academy, T.A. still resides with his family in Nashville, Tennessee. This twenty-one year old who has accomplished a great deal in college past is likely to accomplish a great deal more in the wonderful future which lies ahead. Congratulations to an NDT First Place Speaker worthy in every way of the honor!

# First Place Team

The First Place Team of Marc L. Rubinstein and Rodger R. Cole were also Second and Third Speakers and the Number One First-Bid Team, so it is no understatement to say they fully dominated the 45th National Debate Tournament. Their team victory surprised few knowledgeable observers. They had, after all, won five tournaments prior to the NDT. During one stretch they won fourteen consecutive elimination rounds without even losing a ballot. In a different stretch they put together twenty-five consecutive victories. During the year, they lost only four elimination rounds and won twenty-five while attending ten tournaments, two of which were Round-Robin Tournaments, both of which they won.

Their junior year had been a most successful one, concluding with a final round loss to Harvard at the 44th National Debate Tournament so their return was not unexpected. The route they chose, however, was not typical. In the preliminary rounds they were 6-2 for only the second time all year, losing 2-1 decisions to Dartmouth and Kentucky. Redlands was negative in the octos after a coin toss and Texas ran a new affirmative; they lost the flip again in the quarters and Emory produced yet another new affirmative; finally they were "locked" in both the semis and finals again on the negative. Winning four consecutive negative debates is unheard of at the NDT, let alone defeating three new affirmatives.

Individually, Rodger and Marc performed with equal success to their team record. Rubinstein had been something of a surprise winner of the Top Speaker Award in 1990; but his Second Place finish in 1991 was equally unexpected. He attended nine tournaments in 1990-91 prior to the NDT and was First Speaker at seven of them. At Miami of Ohio he was a full six points

ahead of the second speaker accumulating an amazing eight round total of 232 points. Rodger was among the top ten speakers at virtually every tournament and usually among the top five.

Talk about tradition: 1991 marked the third time the University of Redlands had captured the National Championship, but the first time was exactly forty years ago. It had also been some twenty years since Bill Southworth, then an assistant at UCLA, coached his first National Champion. But this was the fourth appearance in the final round for one of his Redlands teams the other three coming in 1975, 1982, and of course, 1990. The first three had produced 2-3 reversals, but not this time. Why? Bill shrewdly left seven judges on the panel, picking up five of them. It is perhaps justice that this victory came from Redlands' only Top Bid Team, one which Southworth admitted was clearly his "best team ever."

For Rodger it was a dream come true. Having had a respectable career at West Bakersfield High School in California, which he still calls home, his last two years of collegiate debate were quite extra-ordinary. He will assist this year with the Redlands debate program while deciding on either law school or graduate school. For Marc the NDT was simply the culmination of a brilliant debate career. His NFL Final Round loss in 1987 while debating for St. Mark's School of Texas found a welcome "flip" in 1991. Even after this NDT, Marc will also continue in debate, at least for a while. After graduating Magna Cum Laude and Phi Beta Kappa he will pursue a Masters degree at Wake Forest in Communication where he will assist with the debate program before finalizing his plans for either law school or teaching.

# Second Place Team

In less than ten years the University of Michigan has become one of the major powers in NDT debating. Under coach Steve Mancuso, Michigan has reached the quarters, semis, and now the final twice in just seven years. This "past" surely seems to be only a competitive prologue since the most recent final round representative was comprised of two sophomores. They obviously may enjoy two more opportunities to capture a National Championship for Michigan.


Matt Shors has still not finally determined his major, but he may very well follow in his father's legal footsteps. Indeed, Matt's father, John, was in attendance at the NDT when he first saw his son debate in college. Previously, Matt was a most successful debater for Roosevelt High School in Des Moines, Iowa which he still calls home.

For Colin Kahl San Franciseo is home, largely because he participated in the highly successful Richmond Kennedy High School Program there. In reality he was born and spent most of his life in East Lansing, Michigan. His major at Michigan is International Relations and he hopes to pursue that discipline in Graduate School followed by a career in the foreign service.

Just like Redlands, Michigan had some amazing streaks of its own during the year. Entering the NDT they were clearly the hottest team on the circuit. Their consecutive tournament victories at Dartmouth, Northwestern, and Kansas coupled with the NDT presented sixteen straight elimination round victories before the Final Round of that tournament. This was a balanced team as well. Matt and Colin ranked among the Top Ten speakers at virtually every tournament they attended, frequently the top three!

Both young men were elated with their entire NDT performance, especially their victory over Kentucky in the quarters and their emotional 4-3 win over Iowa in the semis. As they put it, "debating Redlands for the National Championship kind of capsulized what this year meant to us." Their first big break had come at the year's outset at Northern Iowa when they defeated Redlands in the quarterfinals. Two weeks later they repeated the performance in the semis at Kentucky preceeding their first major tournament victory. While the ensuing seven debates against Redlands went against them, all were close and by their own evaluation great debates. It was for this reason Michigan chose not to run a new case in the final round as they had in the other three elimination rounds. Going with their Japan affirmative made for, by most accounts, an outstanding debate which truly exemplified the year and the topic. It was a remarkable sophomore year for two young men who obviously have a very bright future ahead!

# First Round At-Large Award



MEMORIAL AWARD FOR REX COPELAND (1969-1989)

In 1990 Samford University and the parents of Rex Bartley Copeland donated an award in their son's honor to give long overdue recognition to the Number One First Round At-Large Team. At the Trinity NDT, the Copeland family unveiled this magnificent pyramid trophy which memorializes their son and recognizes all the recipients of the Top Bid. As in 1989 and 1990 the First At-Large Team went on to win the tournament, Marc Rubinstein and Rodger Cole of the University of Redlands. Marc and Rodger were also close friends of Rex and thus the inscription on the perpetual award holds special significance to them.

"Rex's legacy is his joy of life, his good nature and warm personality make us forever remember him. Family and friends brought him happiness. Debate competition brought him honor among his peers.

Few will have known Rex in a few years except through this Memorial Award. To those lucky enough to remember him, his love of life should be what we think of when his name is mentioned. To those who never knew him, know that his happiness came not from single-minded pursuits, but from a balance of hard work and play. Life is too short to forget those people and events that truly make a difference.

The glory of humankind is to be well remembered. This award is for the few who achieve one of the highest honors in the debate community, so that they too will be well remembered."


