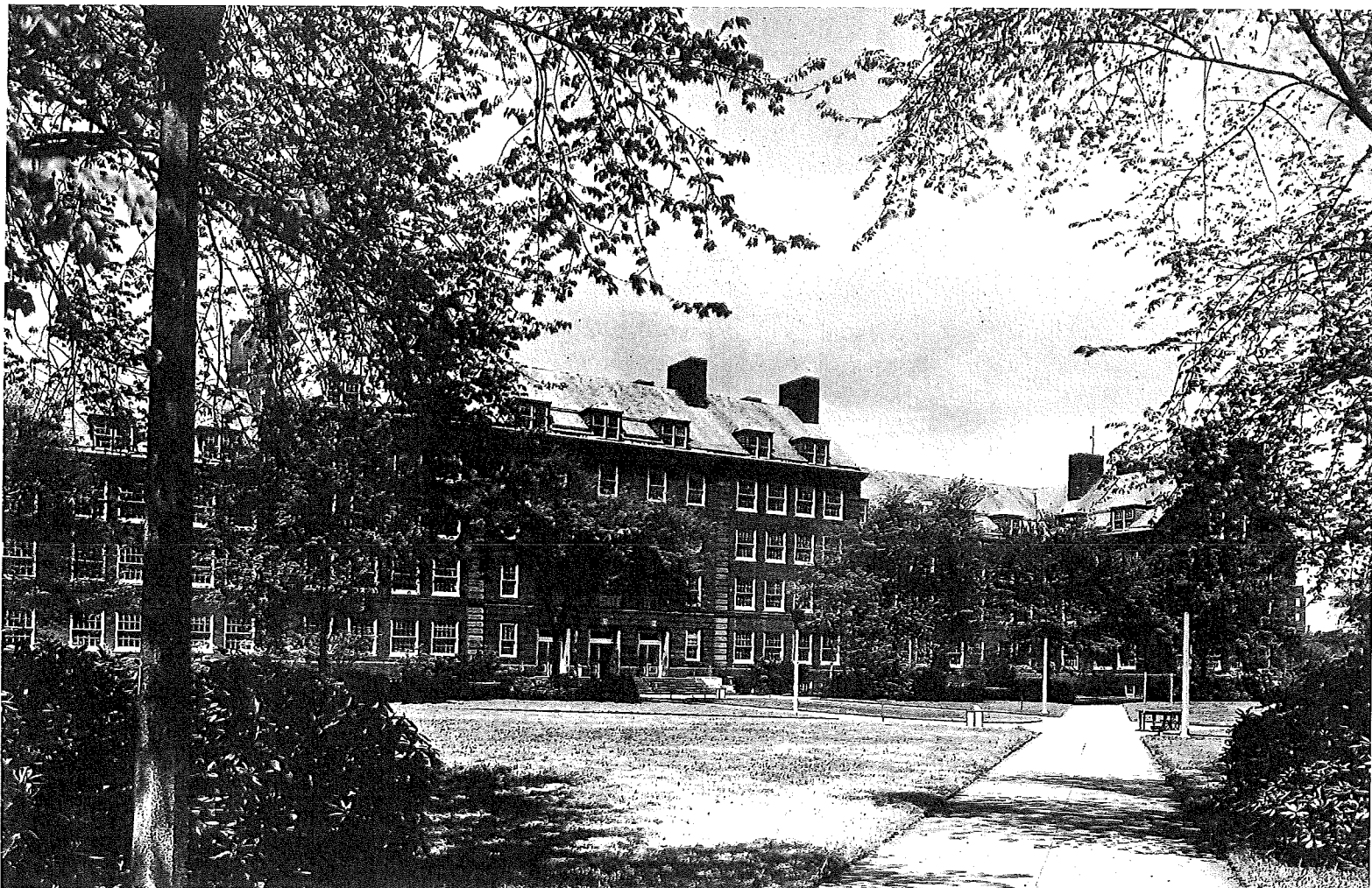

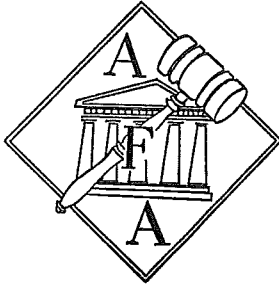



Plaques are awarded each participating team in the tournament. Permanent trophies are awarded to the top four teams. These plaques and trophies have been presented by the Abraham and Strauss Company. Hamilton electric watches are awarded to the top two speakers and to members of the finalist teams. These watches are presented by the Hamilton Watch Company.

NATIONAL DEBATE TOURNAMENT: 1968

The Twenty-Second National Debate Tournament is sponsored by the American Forensic Association. Actual direction of the tournament has come from the National Debate Tournament Committee's thirteen voting members, with considerable assistance from Dr. Charles Parkhurst of Brooklyn College and other AFA members around the country.

As in past years, the country has been divided into eight districts in which tournaments have been held to qualify thirty-six teams for the NDT. For the first time, no automatic invitation has been given either to the winner or runner-up from last year's NDT. Instead, each district committee has evaluated the non-qualifying teams in their district, and the NDT Committee has, through secret balloting, selected eight additional teams to participate at-large.

These forty-four teams should genuinely represent the finest debaters in the United States. The NDT will test these teams with eight preliminary rounds of debate, the last seven of which are power-matched. On the basis of these debates, the sixteen top-seeded teams will compete in four elimination rounds yielding the winner of the National Debate Tournament.

The NDT and the American Forensic Association are grateful to the Hamilton Watch Company of Lancaster, Pennsylvania for the Hamilton Awards, the six Hamilton electric wrist watches given to the two top speakers in the preliminary rounds and four speakers in the final debate; to Sigurd S. Larmon for donating the first-place rotating Larmon Trophy and other support; to Abraham and Strauss Company, New York, for the permanent trophies and plaques; and to Brooklyn College for its substantial support of this tournament.

DEBATE PROCEDURE AND INSTRUCTIONS

The American Forensic Association Form C debate ballot (see opposite page) will be used for all debates. Judges are requested to follow these instructions:

1. Assign a speaker rating to each speaker. This speaker rating need not be a total of checked items (analysis, reasoning, etc.), but should adhere to the following guidelines:

25-30	- superior	7-12	- fair
19-24	- excellent	1-6	- poor
13-18	- average		

2. Do not announce any decision or reveal any decision to any person during the preliminary rounds of the tournament.

3. Seal your ballot and give it to the timekeeper after the round is completed. The timekeeper will return the ballot to tournament headquarters for you. Because the tournament is power-matched, and because limited time is available for this power-matching, please return your ballot to the timekeeper within five minutes of the time the round is completed. Lengthy critiques may be written independent of the ballot and turned into tournament headquarters later.

4. Please, please be sure that the names of the competing teams, the names of the debaters, the decision, and your name as the judge appear on the ballot. It is not considered unethical to give the decision to the team which wins the debate!

Each round of debate begins in the second floor lounge of the Student Center at the time indicated. Debate team pairings and judging assignments will be announced according to lettered stations. As soon as the name of a debate team or judge is announced, that debate team or judge should report to the lettered stations. The timekeeper should have the group leave for the appropriate room and start the debate as soon as all debaters and judges are present. These debates will take place in Whitehead Hall. Written notes on a debate are to be taken by no person other than the participating debaters and judges. Otherwise, observers are welcome to hear any debate during the tournament.

The preliminary rounds of debate will be power-matched as in previous years. In general, the following criteria will govern team matchings in the eight preliminary rounds:

1. No team debates the same team twice.
2. No team debates a team from its own district.
3. Teams debate four affirmative and four negative rounds, but do not necessarily alternate sides from round to round.
4. Teams are matched on a win-loss record.

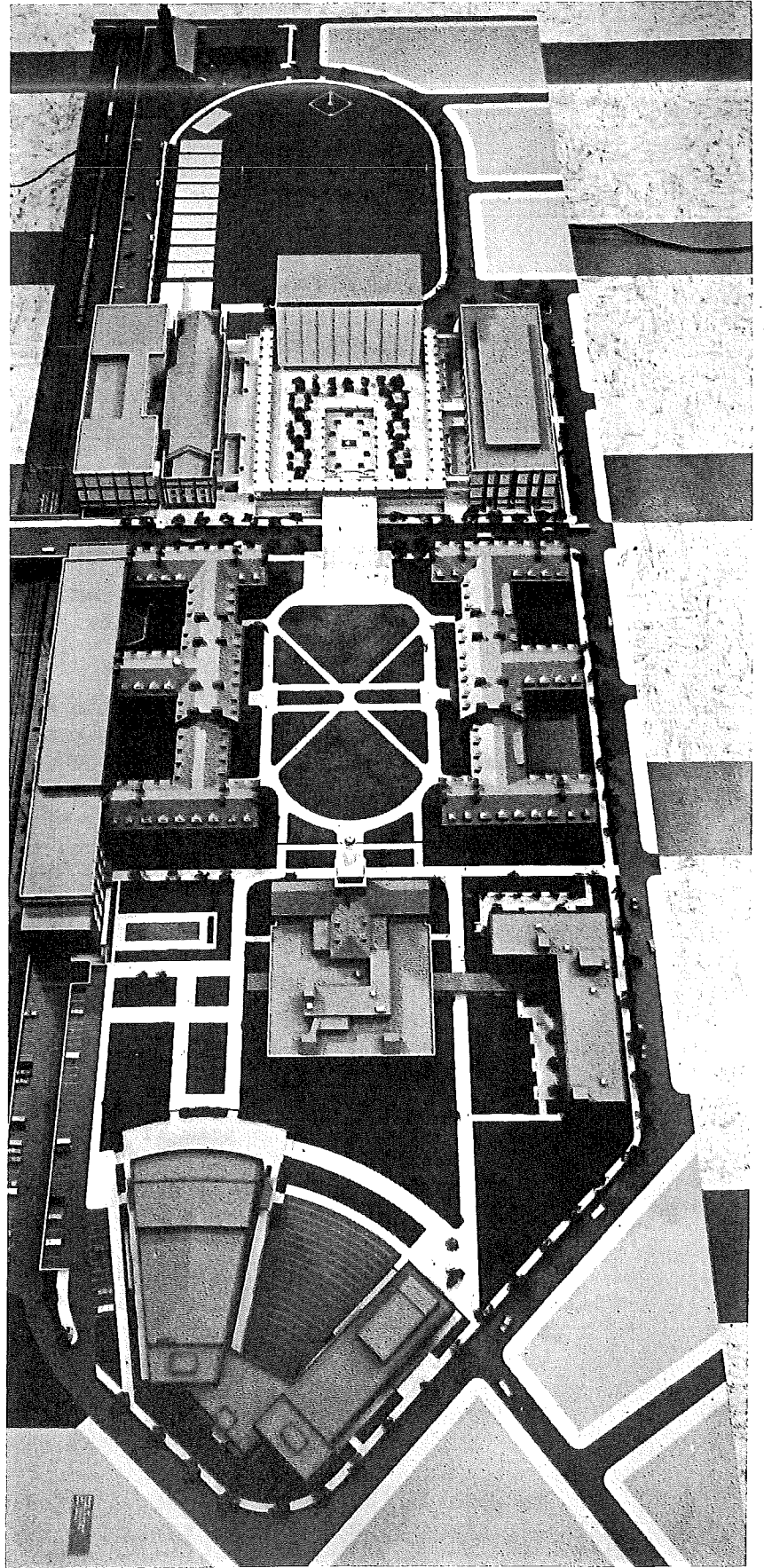
The elimination rounds of the tournament will pair teams according to the following scheme (numbers below represent rank in preliminary rounds):

Octafinals: 1-16, 2-15, 3-14, 4-13, 5-12, 6-11, 7-10, 8-9

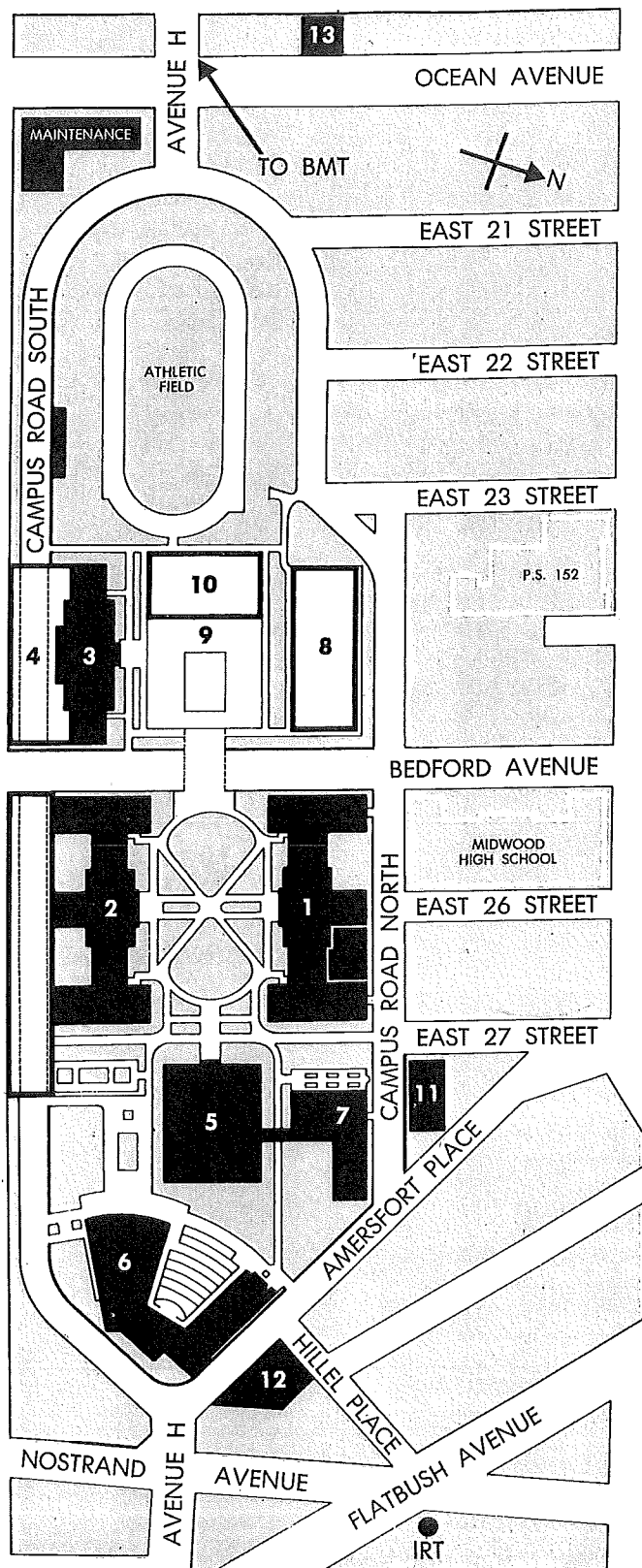
Quarterfinals: winner of 1-16 vs 8,9, of 5-12 vs 4-13, of 6-11 vs 3-14, and of 7-10 vs 2-15

Semifinals: winner of 1-16, 8-9 vs 5-12-4-13, and winner of 2-15-7-10 vs 3-14-6-11 with the survivors meeting in the Finals.

No results (ballots) will be released until after 1:00 PM on Thursday. All judges are expected to be available for all rounds of debate.

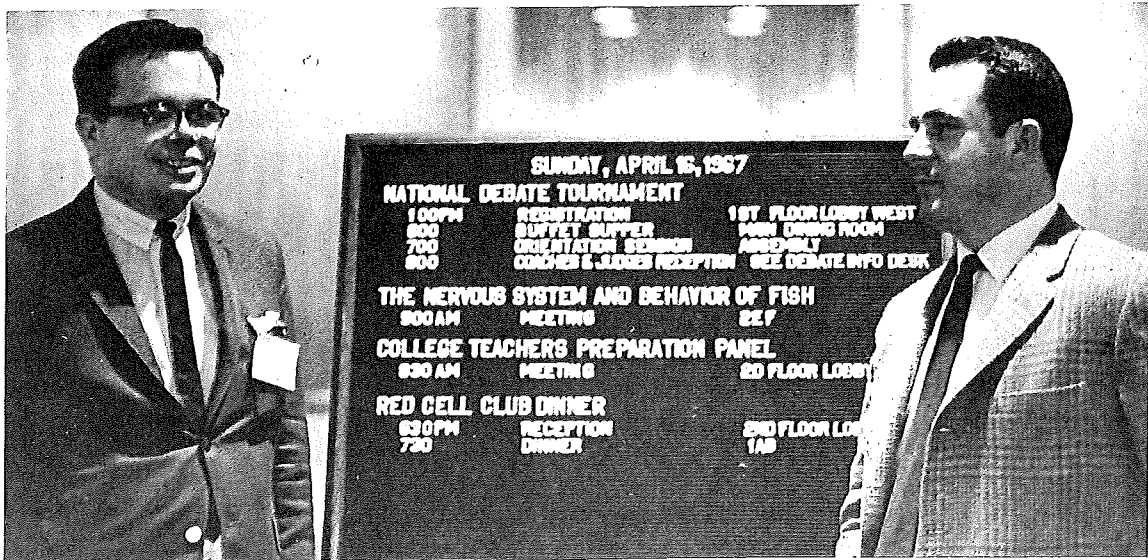
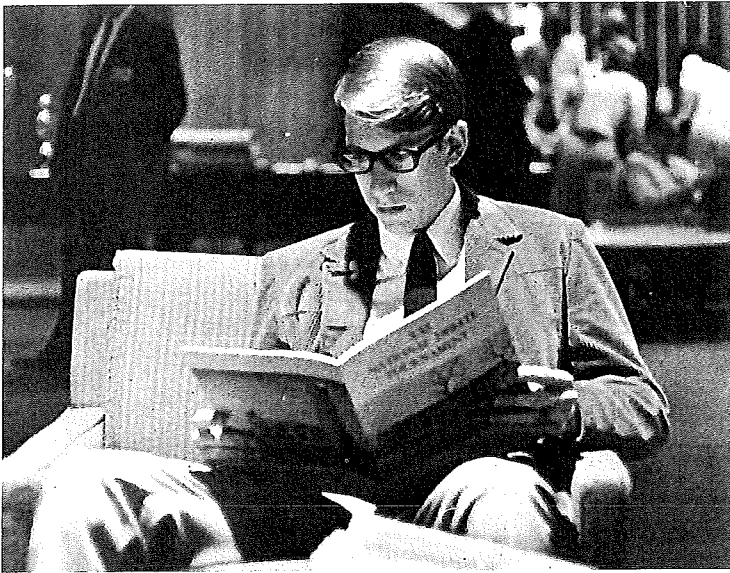
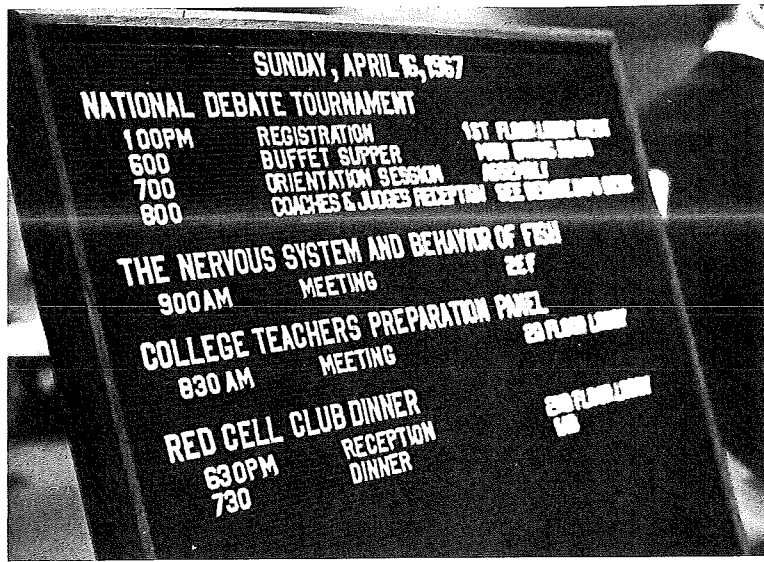


Brooklyn College is located on a 42-acre tract of land in the residential section of Flatbush at Avenue H and Bedford Avenue. The campus is easily accessible by the IRT and BMT subway lines and several bus lines. Presently there are eight campus buildings. Construction of a new classroom building, a plaza structure, plus additions to existing buildings is scheduled to start in 1968. (Model at right)



The Campus

- 1** Boylan Hall: houses administrative offices, food services, the bookstore and classrooms.
- 2** Ingersoll Hall: houses the science departments. An addition to Ingersoll Hall will provide expanded facilities for Biology, Chemistry, Physics and the Integrated Science Program.
- 3** Roosevelt Hall houses the Departments of Health and Physical Education for men and for women, and student health services.
- 4** Roosevelt Hall expansion: facilities will be doubled for both men and medical services.
- 5** LaGuardia Hall and the College Library. The tower section of the building, houses student activities, a reading area, and faculty offices.
- 6** Whitman Hall: houses the 500-seat George Gershwin Theater, the 2,500 seat Walt Whitman Auditorium, the Department of Music and theater facilities of the Department of Speech and Theater.
- 7** Whitehead Hall: houses the social science departments and the Television Center.
- 8** William James Hall: a proposed new classroom building that will house the departments of Education, Mathematics, and Psychology. (Presently tennis courts).
- 9** The proposed Elevated Plaza will rise 17 feet above street level and will have two sub-levels for classrooms, faculty offices, lecture halls, an art museum, the college bookstore, a student food service and storage areas.
- 10** A proposed 10-story academic building.
- 11** The Student Center: houses lounges, meeting rooms, a dining room and game room.
- 12** The Hillel Building.
- 13** The Newman Center.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Housing: All participants in the 1968 National Debate Tournament will be housed in the Golden Gate Motor Hotel. Each school or individual is responsible for payment to the Hotel upon checking out. The cost of housing is in addition to the registration fee. Rates are established at \$13/day for singles, \$15/day for doubles, and \$18/day for triples. Guest judges will be given a check to cover the cost of their housing. There is ample parking available at the Hotel for those who choose to drive; parking will also be available at a faculty lot near the Student Center for those who drive from the Hotel to the campus.

Transportation: Chartered bus transportation will be provided for those who are not driving in the morning and evening of each day that debates are held on campus. In addition, New York City buses run from campus to within a short distance from the Hotel and taxis are not exorbitant for the distance; if you have questions, ask any of the Brooklyn College personnel.

Meals: Participants are responsible for their own breakfasts. Dinner on April 15 will be at the Hotel; lunches on April 16-18, dinner on April 16, and the banquet on April 17 will all be in the dining room of the Student Center in accord with the tournament schedule. Persons who have not pre-paid for meals will find various restaurants near campus which are satisfactory. Persons eating with the NDT group must have identification badges in order to served.

Debates: All preliminary rounds of debate will be in Whitehead Hall, across from the Student Center. Elimination round debates will be held in Whitehead Hall except for one semi-final round and the final debate. These will be held in Gershwin Theater. The final and semi-final debates will all be recorded on video tape; participants will require some make-up and should be prepared to observe the time limits exactly.

SPECIAL NOTE: Coaches and judges are expected to be available for all rounds of debate including the elimination rounds on Thursday. Coaches of teams who do not qualify for the elimination rounds should nevertheless be available for judging assignments in the elimination rounds.

Absolutely no tournament results (ballots) will be released prior to 1:00 PM on Thursday.

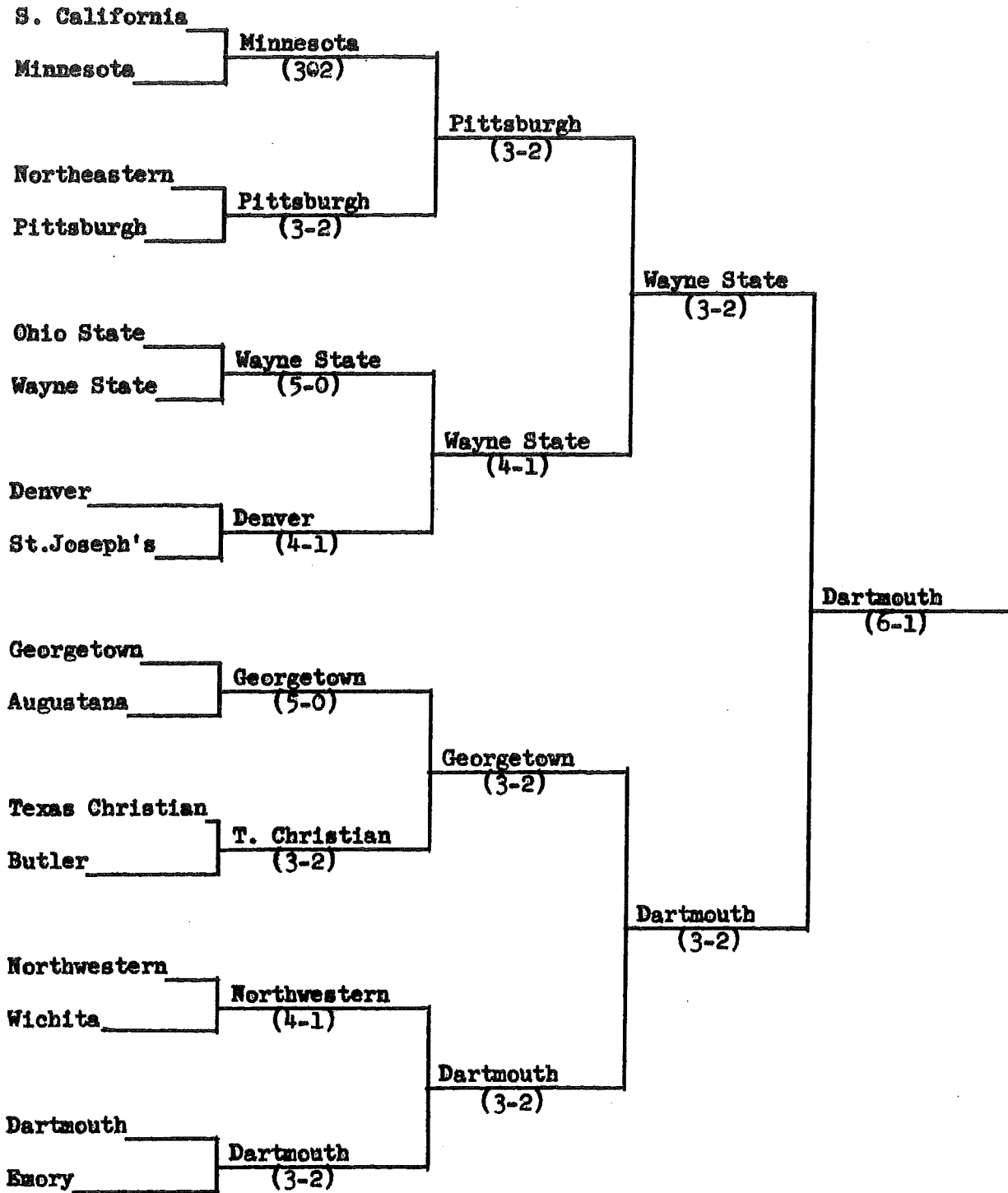

ELIMINATION ROUNDS OF 1967 NDT



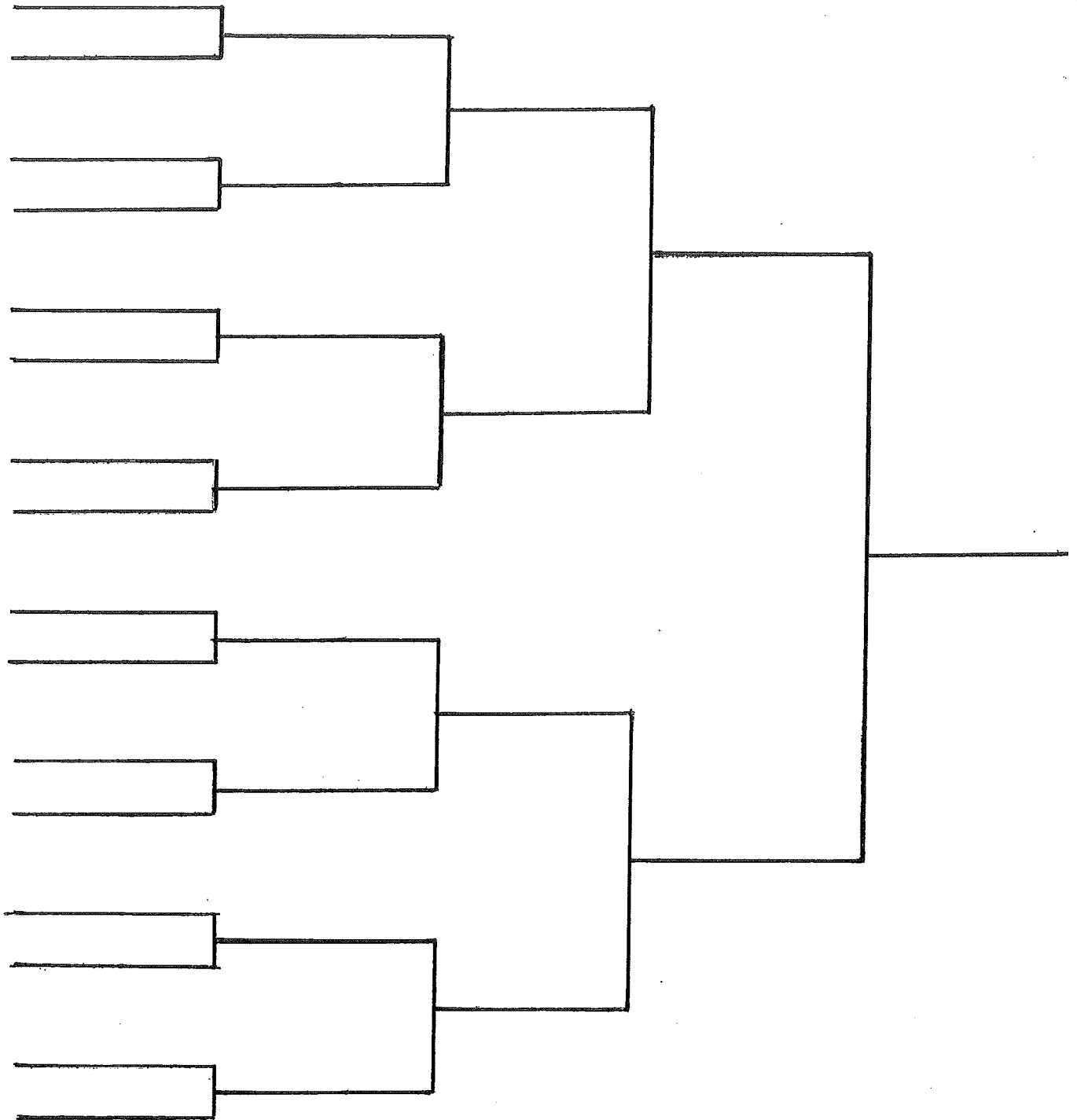
